General Description

The 256Mb SDRAM is a high-speed CMOS, dynamic random-access memory containing 268,435,456 bits. It is internally configured as a quad-bank DRAM with a synchronous interface (all signals are registered on the positive edge of the clock signal, CLK). Each of the x4's 67,108,864-bit banks is organized as 8,192 rows by 2,048 columns by 4 bits. Each of the x8's 67,108,864-bit banks is organized as 8,192 rows by 1,024 columns by 8 bits. Each of the x16's 67,108,864-bit banks is organized as 8,192 rows by 512 columns by 16 bits.

Read and write accesses to the SDRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an ACTIVE command, which is then followed by a READ or WRITE command. The address bits registered coincident with the ACTIVE command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed (BA0, BA1 select the bank; A0–A12 select the row). The address bits registered coincident with the READ or WRITE command are used to select the starting column location for the burst access.

The SDRAM provides for programmable read or write burst lengths (BL) of 1, 2, 4, or 8 locations, or the full page, with a burst terminate option. An auto precharge function may be enabled to provide a self-timed row precharge that is initiated at the end of the burst sequence.

The 256Mb SDRAM uses an internal pipelined architecture to achieve high-speed operation. This architecture is compatible with the 2n rule of prefetch architectures, but it also allows the column address to be changed on every clock cycle to achieve a high-speed, fully random access. Precharging one bank while accessing one of the other three banks will hide the PRECHARGE cycles and provide seamless, high-speed, random-access operation.

The 256Mb SDRAM is designed to operate in 3.3V memory systems. An auto refresh mode is provided, along with a power-saving, power-down mode. All inputs and outputs are LVTTTL-compatible.

SDRAMs offer substantial advances in DRAM operating performance, including the ability to synchronously burst data at a high data rate with automatic column-address generation, the ability to interleave between internal banks to hide precharge time, and the capability to randomly change column addresses on each clock cycle during a burst access.

Automotive Temperature

The automotive temperature (AT) option adheres to the following specifications:

- 16ms refresh rate
- Self refresh not supported
- Ambient and case temperature cannot be less than -40°C or greater than $+105^{\circ}\text{C}$

Figure 1: 64 Meg x 4 SDRAM Functional Block Diagram

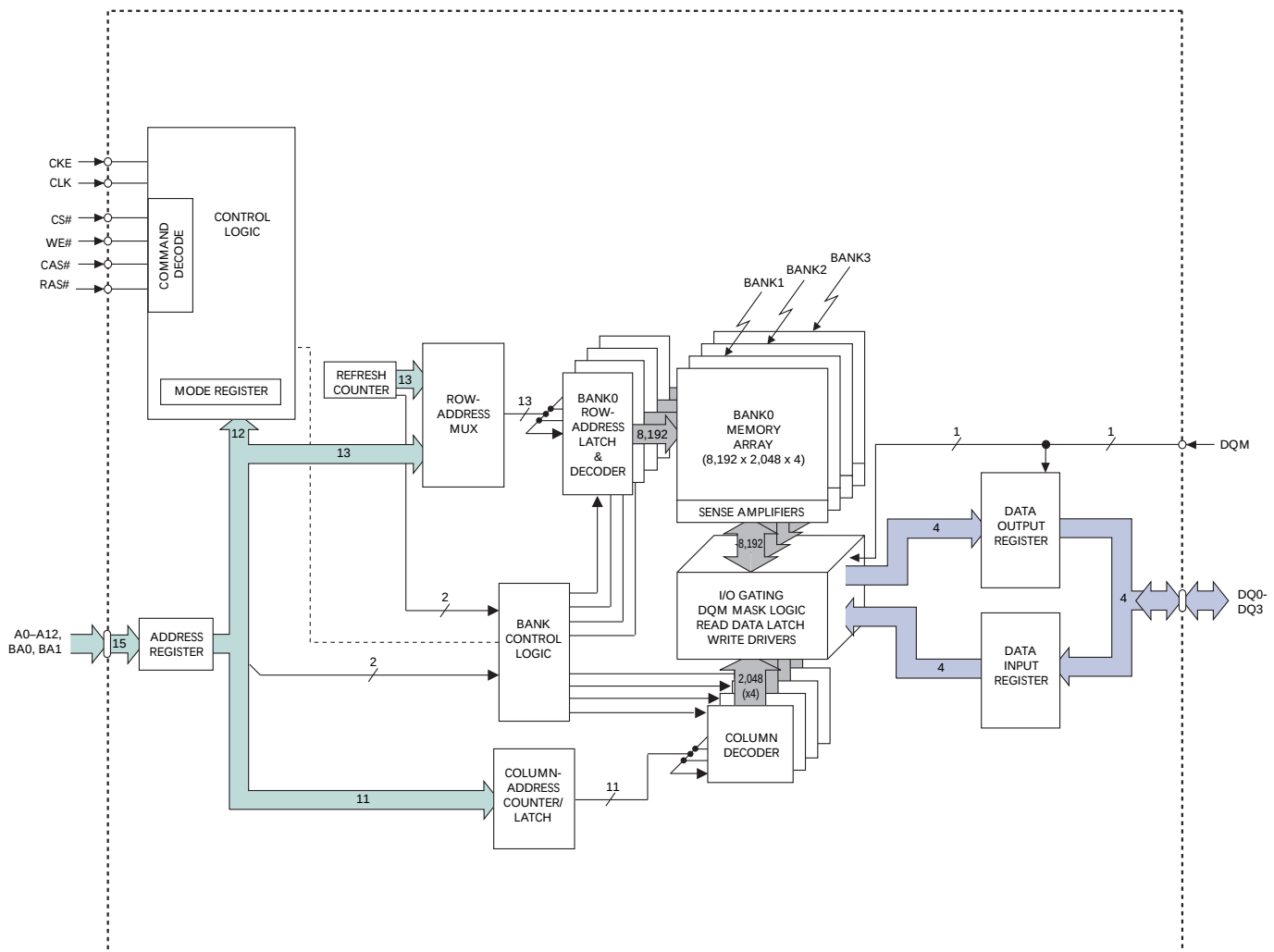
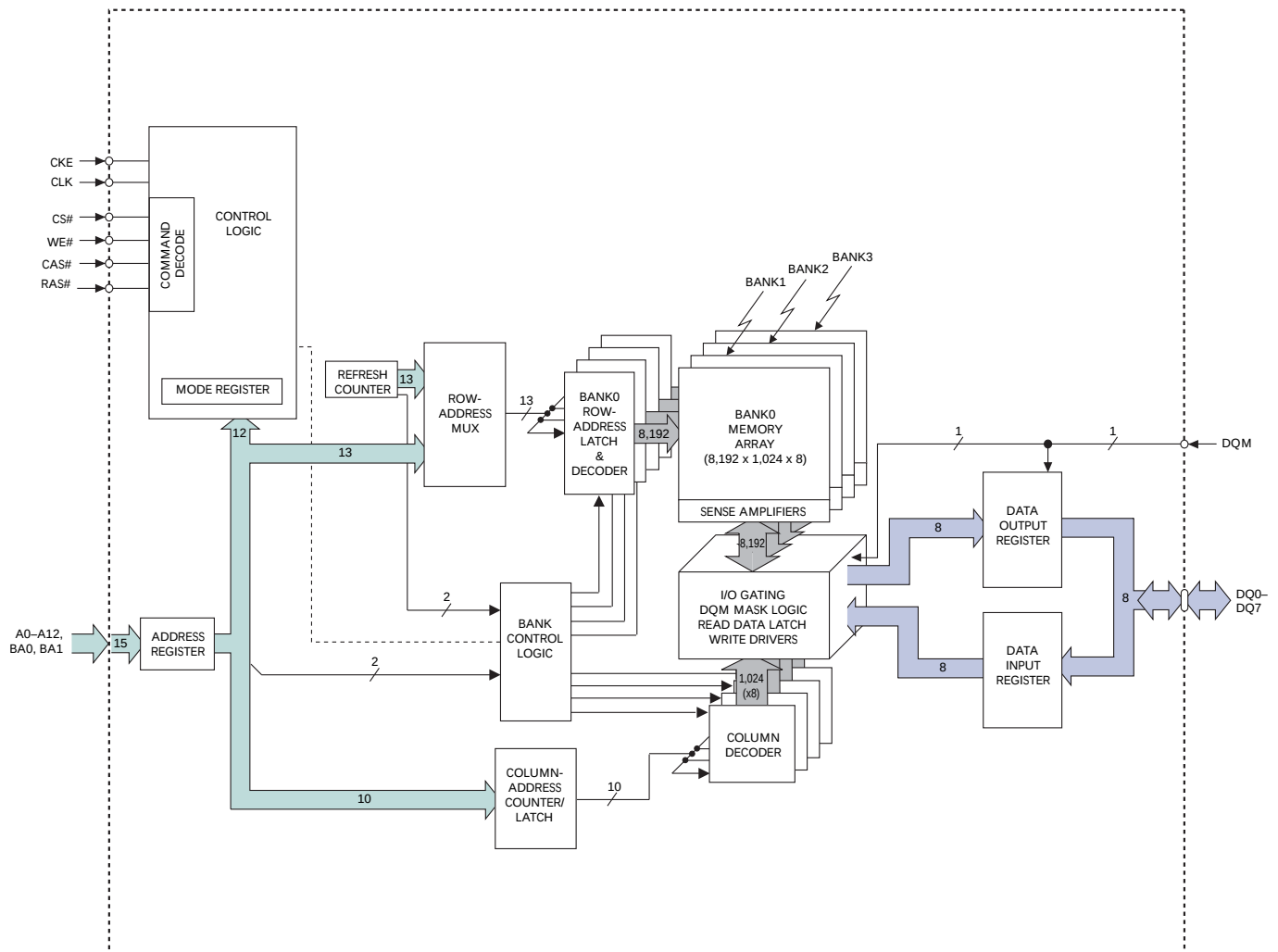


Figure 2: 32 Meg x 8 SDRAM Functional Block Diagram

 - The **ROW-ADDRESS MUX** provides a 13-bit signal to the **BANK0 ROW-ADDRESS LATCH & DECODER**.
 - The **BANK0 ROW-ADDRESS LATCH & DECODER** provides an 8,192-bit signal to the **BANK0 MEMORY ARRAY (8,192 x 512 x 16)**.
 - The **BANK0 MEMORY ARRAY** is connected to **BANK1**, **BANK2**, and **BANK3**.
 - The **SENSE AMPLIFIERS** receive data from the memory array and provide an 8,192-bit signal to the **I/O GATING DQM MASK LOGIC READ DATA LATCH WRITE DRIVERS**.
 - The **COLUMN-ADDRESS COUNTER/LATCH** provides a 9-bit signal to the **COLUMN DECODER**.
 - The **COLUMN DECODER** provides a 512 (x16) bit signal to the **I/O GATING DQM MASK LOGIC READ DATA LATCH WRITE DRIVERS**.
- Data Path and Output:**
 - The **I/O GATING DQM MASK LOGIC READ DATA LATCH WRITE DRIVERS** provide a 16-bit signal to the **DATA OUTPUT REGISTER** and a 16-bit signal to the **DATA INPUT REGISTER**.
 - The **DATA OUTPUT REGISTER** provides a 2-bit signal to the **DQML, DQM#** output.
 - The **DATA INPUT REGISTER** provides a 16-bit signal to the **DQ0-DQ15** input.

Figure 4: 54-Pin TSOP Assignment (Top View)

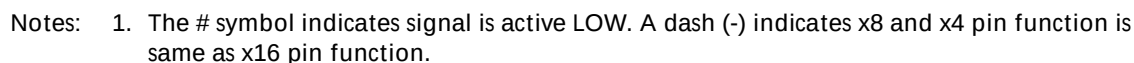
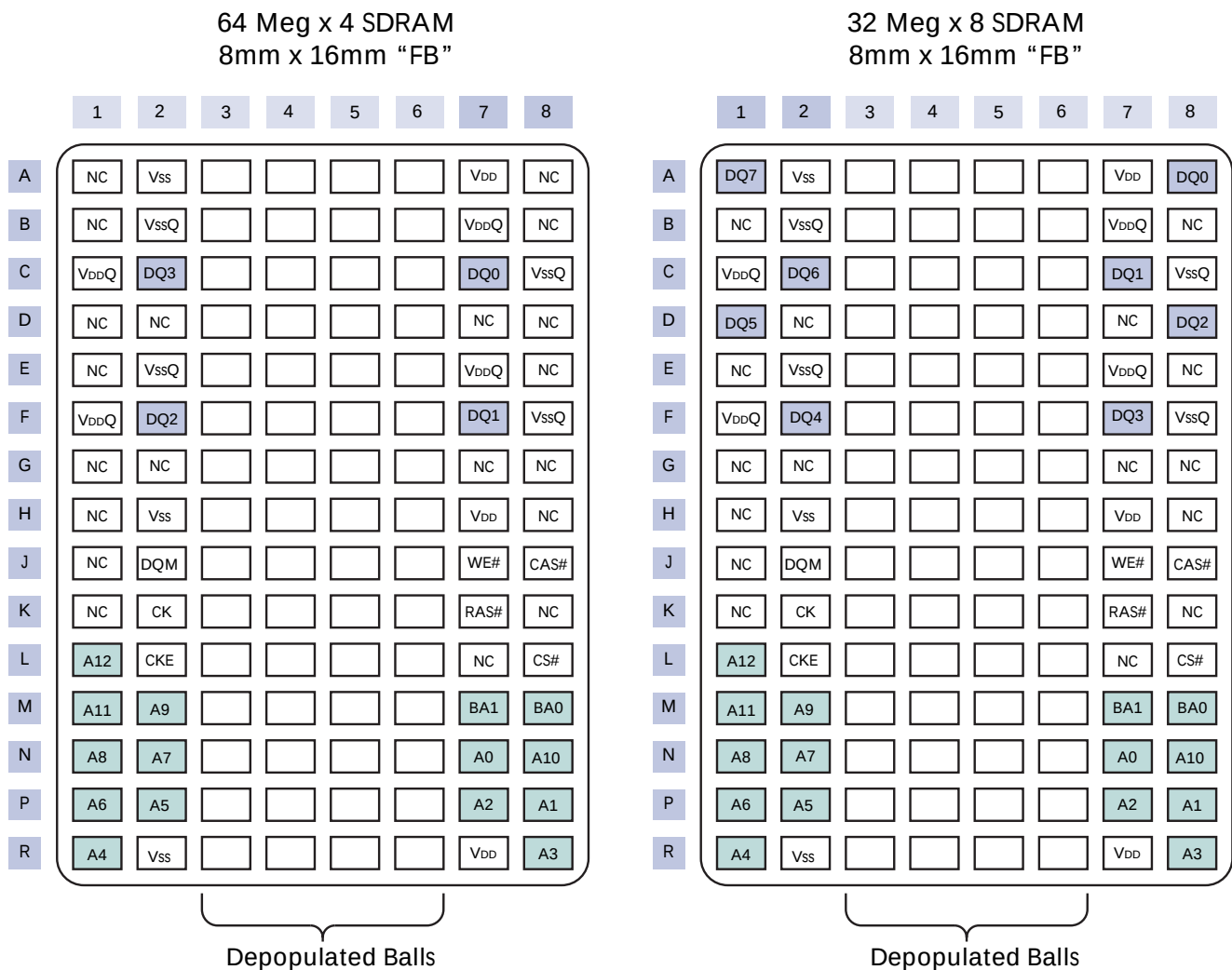
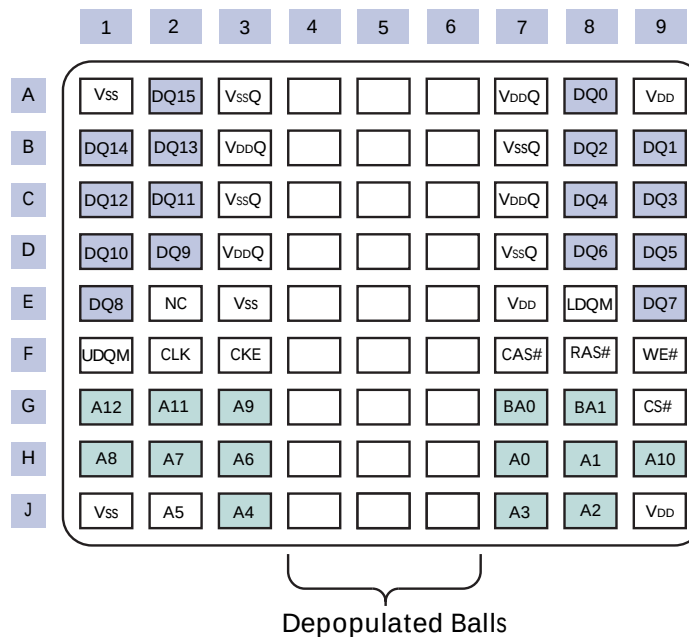


Figure 5: 60-Ball FBGA Assignment (Top View)

Functional Description

In general, the 256Mb SDRAMs (16 Meg x 4 x 4 banks, 8 Meg x 8 x 4 banks, and 4 Meg x 16 x 4 banks) are quad-bank DRAMs that operate at 3.3V and include a synchronous interface (all signals are registered on the positive edge of the clock signal, CLK). Each of the x4's 67,108,864-bit banks is organized as 8,192 rows by 2,048 columns by 4 bits. Each of the x8's 67,108,864-bit banks is organized as 8,192 rows by 1,024 columns by 8 bits. Each of the x16's 67,108,864-bit banks is organized as 8,192 rows by 512 columns by 16 bits.

Read and write accesses to the SDRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an ACTIVE command, which is then followed by a READ or WRITE command. The address bits registered coincident with the ACTIVE command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed (BA0 and BA1 select the bank, A0–A12 select the row). The address bits (x4: A0–A9, A11; x8: A0–A9; x16: A0–A8) registered coincident with the READ or WRITE command are used to select the starting column location for the burst access.

Prior to normal operation, the SDRAM must be initialized. The following sections provide detailed information covering device initialization, register definition, command descriptions, and device operation.

Initialization

SDRAMs must be powered up and initialized in a predefined manner. Operational procedures other than those specified may result in undefined operation. After power is applied to VDD and VDDQ (simultaneously) and the clock is stable (stable clock is defined as a signal cycling within timing constraints specified for the clock pin), the SDRAM requires a 100µs delay prior to issuing any command other than a COMMAND

INHIBIT or NOP. Starting at some point during this 100 μ s period and continuing at least through the end of this period, COMMAND INHIBIT or NOP commands must be applied.

After the 100 μ s delay has been satisfied with at least one COMMAND INHIBIT or NOP command having been applied, a PRECHARGE command should be applied. All banks must then be precharged, thereby placing the device in the all banks idle state.

Once in the idle state, at least two AUTO REFRESH cycles must be performed. After the AUTO REFRESH cycles are complete, the SDRAM is ready for mode register programming. Because the mode register will power up in an unknown state, it must be loaded prior to applying any operational command. If desired, the two AUTO REFRESH commands can be issued after the LMR command.

The recommended power-up sequence for SDRAMs:

1. Simultaneously apply power to VDD and VDDQ.
2. Assert and hold CKE at a LVTTTL logic LOW since all inputs and outputs are LVTTTL-compatible.
3. Provide stable CLOCK signal. Stable clock is defined as a signal cycling within timing constraints specified for the clock pin.
4. Wait at least 100 μ s prior to issuing any command other than a COMMAND INHIBIT or NOP.
5. Starting at some point during this 100 μ s period, bring CKE HIGH. Continuing at least through the end of this period, 1 or more COMMAND INHIBIT or NOP commands must be applied.
6. Perform a PRECHARGE ALL command.
7. Wait at least t_{RP} time; during this time NOPs or DESELECT commands must be given. All banks will complete their precharge, thereby placing the device in the all banks idle state.
8. Issue an AUTO REFRESH command.
9. Wait at least t_{RFC} time, during which only NOPs or COMMAND INHIBIT commands are allowed.
10. Issue an AUTO REFRESH command.
11. Wait at least t_{RFC} time, during which only NOPs or COMMAND INHIBIT commands are allowed.
12. The SDRAM is now ready for mode register programming. Because the mode register will power up in an unknown state, it should be loaded with desired bit values prior to applying any operational command. Using the LMR command, program the mode register. The mode register is programmed via the MODE REGISTER SET command with BA1 = 0, BA0 = 0 and retains the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power. Not programming the mode register upon initialization will result in default settings which may not be desired. Outputs are guaranteed High-Z after the LMR command is issued. Outputs should be High-Z already before the LMR command is issued.
13. Wait at least t_{MRD} time, during which only NOP or DESELECT commands are allowed.

At this point the DRAM is ready for any valid command.

Note: If desired, more than two AUTO REFRESH commands can be issued in the sequence. After steps 9 and 10 are complete, repeat them until the desired number of AUTO REFRESH + t_{RFC} loops is achieved.

Register Definition

Mode Register

The mode register is used to define the specific mode of operation of the SDRAM. This definition includes the selection of BL, a burst type, CL, an operating mode, and a write burst mode, as shown in Figure 7 on page 18. The mode register is programmed via the LOAD MODE REGISTER command and will retain the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power.

Mode register bits M0–M2 specify BL, M3 specifies the type of burst (sequential or interleaved), M4–M6 specify CL, M7, and M8 specify the operating mode, M9 specifies the write burst mode, and M10 and M11 are reserved for future use. Address A12 (M12) is undefined but should be driven LOW during loading of the mode register.

The mode register must be loaded when all banks are idle, and the controller must wait the specified time before initiating the subsequent operation. Violating either of these requirements will result in unspecified operation.

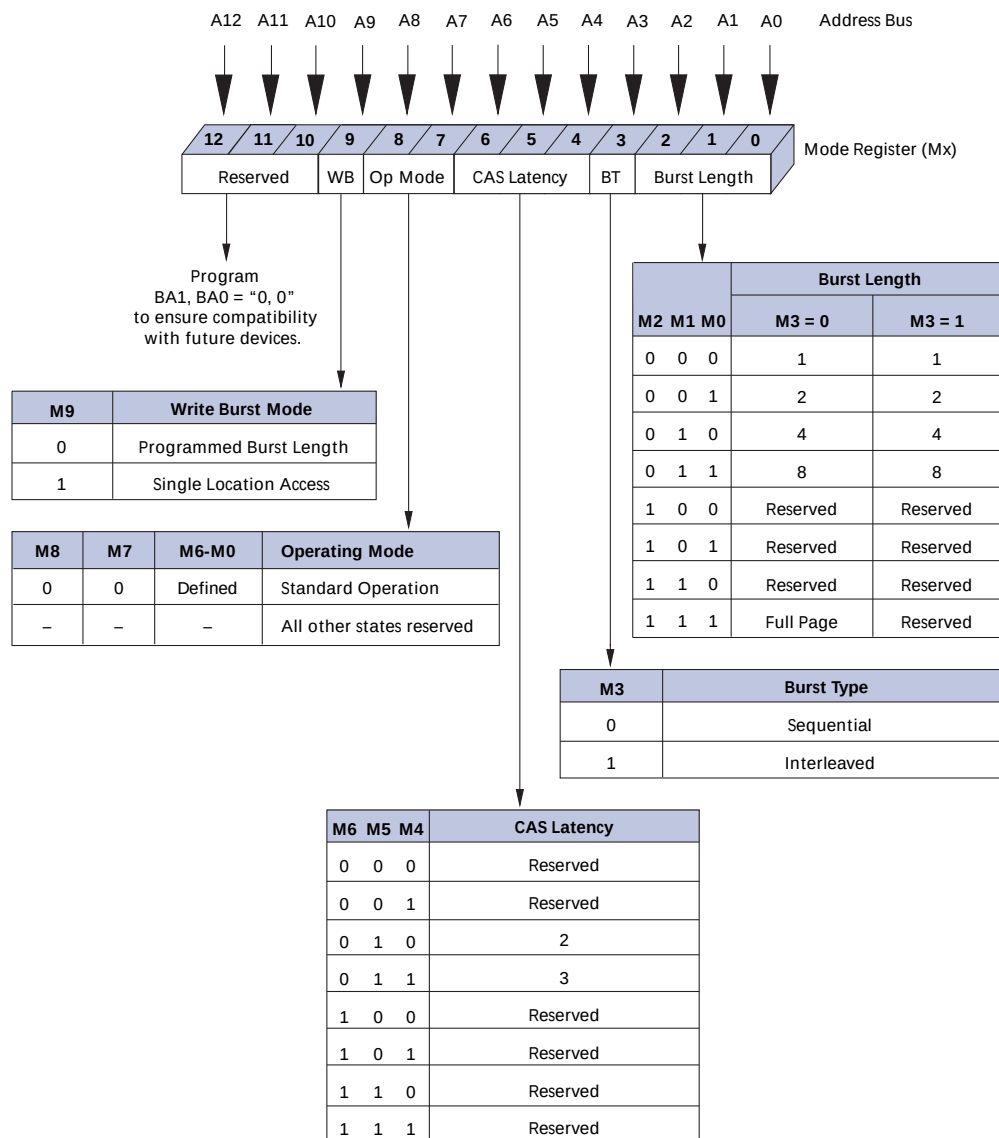
Burst Length (BL)

Read and write accesses to the SDRAM are burst oriented, with BL being programmable, as shown in Figure 7 on page 18. BL determines the maximum number of column locations that can be accessed for a given READ or WRITE command. Burst lengths of 1, 2, 4, or 8 locations are available for both the sequential and the interleaved burst types, and a full-page burst is available for the sequential mode. The full-page burst is used in conjunction with the BURST TERMINATE command to generate arbitrary BLs.

Reserved states cannot be used, because unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

When a READ or WRITE command is issued, a block of columns equal to BL is effectively selected. All accesses for that burst take place within this block, meaning that the burst will wrap within the block if a boundary is reached. The block is uniquely selected by A1–A9, A11 (x4), A1–A9 (x8) or A1–A8 (x16) when BL = 2; by A2–A9, A11 (x4), A2–A9 (x8) or A2–A8 (x16) when BL = 4; and by A3–A9, A11 (x4), A3–A9 (x8) or A3–A8 (x16) when BL = 8. The remaining (least significant) address bit(s) is (are) used to select the starting location within the block. Full-page bursts wrap within the page if the boundary is reached.

Operating Mode

The normal operating mode is selected by setting M7 and M8 to zero; the other combinations of values for M7 and M8 are reserved for future use and/or test modes. The programmed BL applies to both READ and WRITE bursts.

Test modes and reserved states should not be used because unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

Write Burst Mode

When M9 = 0, BL programmed via M0–M2 applies to both READ and WRITE bursts; when M9 = 1, the programmed BL applies to READ bursts, but write accesses are single-location (nonburst) accesses.

Burst Type

Accesses within a given burst may be programmed either to be sequential or interleaved; this is referred to as the burst type and is selected via bit M3.

The ordering of accesses within a burst is determined by BL, the burst type, and the starting column address, as shown in Table 6.

CAS Latency (CL)

CL is the delay, in clock cycles, between the registration of a READ command and the availability of the first piece of output data. The latency can be set to two or three clocks.

If a READ command is registered at clock edge n and the latency is m clocks, the data will be available by clock edge $n + m$. The DQs will start driving as a result of the clock edge one cycle earlier ($n + m - 1$), and provided that the relevant access times are met, the data will be valid by clock edge $n + m$. For example, assuming that the clock cycle time is such that all relevant access times are met, if a READ command is registered at T_0 and the latency is programmed to two clocks, the DQs will start driving after T_1 and the data will be valid by T_2 , as shown in Figure 8. Table 7 on page 21 indicates the operating frequencies at which each CL setting can be used.

Reserved states cannot be used as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

Figure 8: CAS Latency

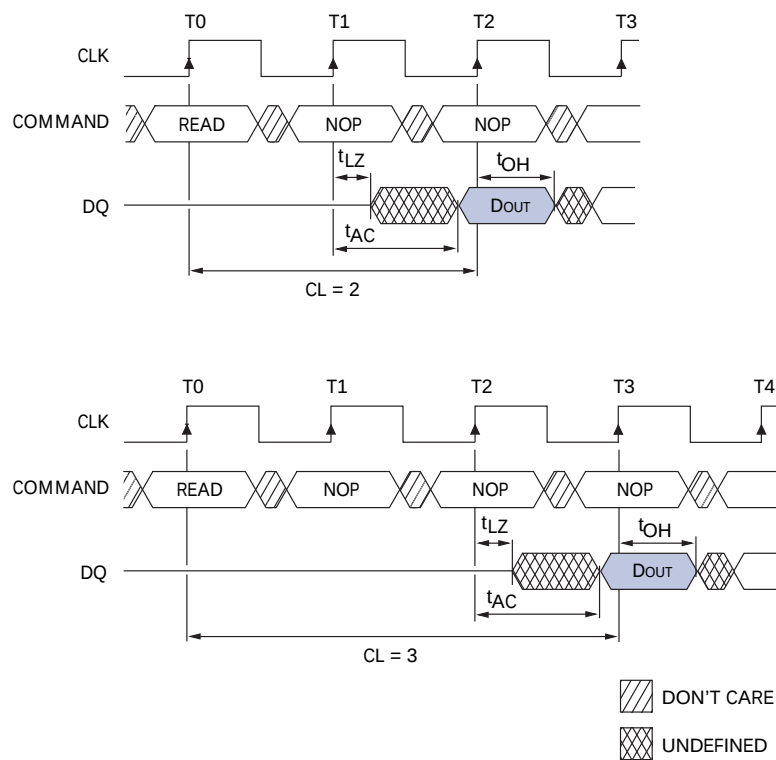

Commands

The COMMAND INHIBIT

The COMMAND INHIBIT function prevents new commands from being executed by the SDRAM, regardless of whether the CLK signal is enabled. The SDRAM is effectively deselected. Operations already in progress are not affected.

NO OPERATION (NOP)

The NO OPERATION (NOP) command is used to perform a NOP to an SDRAM that is selected (CS# is LOW). This prevents unwanted commands from being registered during idle or wait states. Operations already in progress are not affected.

LOAD MODE REGISTER

The mode register is loaded via inputs A0–A11 (A12 should be driven LOW.) See “Register Definition” on page 17. The LOAD MODE REGISTER command can only be issued when all banks are idle, and a subsequent executable command cannot be issued until ^tMRD is met.

ACTIVE

The ACTIVE command is used to open (or activate) a row in a particular bank for a subsequent access. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0–A12 selects the row. This row remains active (or open) for accesses until a PRECHARGE command is issued to that bank. A PRECHARGE command must be issued before opening a different row in the same bank.

READ

The READ command is used to initiate a burst read access to an active row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0–A9, A11 (x4), A0–A9 (x8), or A0–A8 (x16) selects the starting column location. The value on input A10 determines whether auto precharge is used. If auto precharge is selected, the row being accessed will be precharged at the end of the READ burst; if auto precharge is not selected, the row will remain open for subsequent accesses. Read data appears on the DQs subject to the logic level on the DQM inputs two clocks earlier. If a given DQM signal was registered HIGH, the corresponding DQs will be High-Z two clocks later; if the DQM signal was registered LOW, the DQs will provide valid data.

WRITE

The WRITE command is used to initiate a burst write access to an active row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0–A9; A11 (x4); A0–A9 (x8); or A0–A8 (x16) selects the starting column location. The value on input A10 determines whether auto precharge is used. If auto precharge is selected, the row being accessed will be precharged at the end of the WRITE burst; if auto precharge is not selected, the row will remain open for subsequent accesses. Input data appearing on the DQs is written to the memory array subject to the DQM input logic level appearing coincident with the data. If a given DQM signal is registered LOW, the corresponding data will be written to memory; if the DQM signal is registered HIGH, the corresponding data inputs will be ignored, and a WRITE will not be executed to that byte/column location.

PRECHARGE

The PRECHARGE command is used to deactivate the open row in a particular bank or the open row in all banks. The bank(s) will be available for a subsequent row access a specified time (^tRP) after the PRECHARGE command is issued. Input A10 determines whether one or all banks are to be precharged, and in the case where only one bank is to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 select the bank. Otherwise BA0, BA1 are treated as “Don’t Care.” After a bank has been precharged, it is in the idle state and must be activated prior to any READ or WRITE commands being issued to that bank.

Auto Precharge

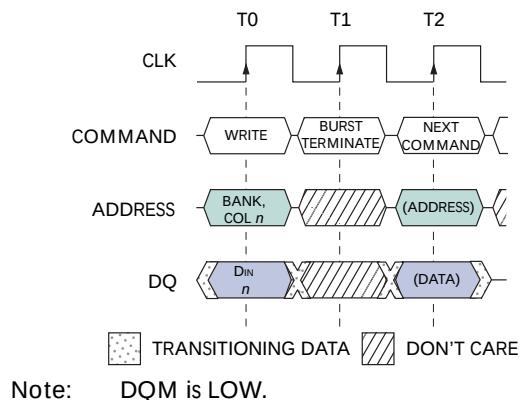
Auto precharge is a feature that performs the same individual-bank precharge function described above, without requiring an explicit command. This is accomplished by using A10 to enable auto precharge in conjunction with a specific READ or WRITE command. A precharge of the bank/row that is addressed with the READ or WRITE command is automatically performed upon completion of the READ or WRITE burst, except in the full-page burst mode, where auto precharge does not apply. Auto precharge is nonpersistent in that it is either enabled or disabled for each individual READ or WRITE command.

Auto precharge ensures that the precharge is initiated at the earliest valid stage within a burst. The user must not issue another command to the same bank until the precharge time (t_{RP}) is completed. This is determined as if an explicit PRECHARGE command was issued at the earliest possible time, as described for each burst type in “Operations” on page 25.

BURST TERMINATE

The BURST TERMINATE command is used to truncate either fixed-length or full-page bursts. The most recently registered READ or WRITE command prior to the BURST TERMINATE command will be truncated, as shown in “Operations” on page 25. The BURST TERMINATE command does not precharge the row; the row will remain open until a PRECHARGE command is issued.

AUTO REFRESH

AUTO REFRESH is used during normal operation of the SDRAM and is analogous to CAS#-BEFORE-RAS# (CBR) refresh in conventional DRAMs. This command is nonpersistent, so it must be issued each time a refresh is required. All active banks must be precharged prior to issuing an AUTO REFRESH command. The AUTO REFRESH command should not be issued until the minimum t_{RP} has been met after the PRECHARGE command, as shown in “Operations” on page 25.

The addressing is generated by the internal refresh controller. This makes the address bits a “Don’t Care” during an AUTO REFRESH command. Regardless of device width, the 256Mb SDRAM requires 8,192 AUTO REFRESH cycles every 64ms (commercial and industrial) or 16ms (automotive). Providing a distributed AUTO REFRESH command every 7.813 μ s (commercial and industrial) or 1.953 μ s (automotive) will meet the refresh

requirement and ensure that each row is refreshed. Alternatively, 8,192 AUTO REFRESH commands can be issued in a burst at the minimum cycle rate (t_{RFC}), once every 64ms (commercial and industrial) or 16ms (automotive).

SELF REFRESH

The SELF REFRESH command can be used to retain data in the SDRAM, even if the rest of the system is powered down. When in the self refresh mode, the SDRAM retains data without external clocking.

The SELF REFRESH command is initiated like an AUTO REFRESH command except CKE is disabled (LOW). After the SELF REFRESH command is registered, all the inputs to the SDRAM become a “Don’t Care” with the exception of CKE, which must remain LOW.

After self refresh mode is engaged, the SDRAM provides its own internal clocking, causing it to perform its own AUTO REFRESH cycles. The SDRAM must remain in self refresh mode for a minimum period equal to t_{RAS} and may remain in self refresh mode for an indefinite period beyond that.

The procedure for exiting self refresh requires a sequence of commands. First, CLK must be stable (stable clock is defined as a signal cycling within timing constraints specified for the clock pin) prior to CKE going back HIGH. After CKE is HIGH, the SDRAM must have NOP commands issued (a minimum of two clocks) for t_{XSR} because time is required for the completion of any internal refresh in progress.

Upon exiting the self refresh mode, AUTO REFRESH commands must be issued every 7.81μs or less as both SELF REFRESH and AUTO REFRESH utilize the row refresh counter.

Self refresh is not supported on automotive temperature (AT) devices.

Operations

Bank/Row Activation

Before any READ or WRITE commands can be issued to a bank within the SDRAM, a row in that bank must be “opened.” This is accomplished via the ACTIVE command, which selects both the bank and the row to be activated (see Figure 10 on page 26).

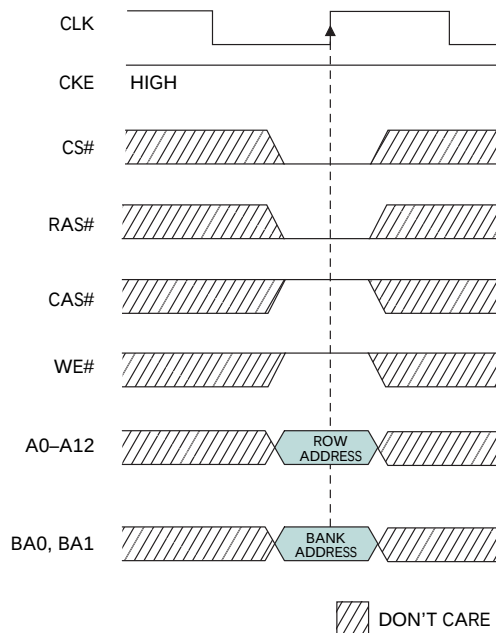
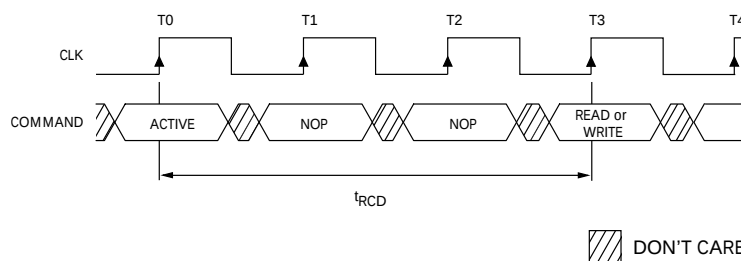


Figure 11: Example: Meeting $t_{RCD}(\text{MIN})$ When $2 < t_{RCD}(\text{MIN})/t_{CK} \leq 3$

After opening a row (issuing an ACTIVE command), a READ or WRITE command may be issued to that row, subject to the t_{RCD} specification. $t_{RCD}(\text{MIN})$ should be divided by the clock period and rounded up to the next whole number to determine the earliest clock edge after the ACTIVE command on which a READ or WRITE command can be entered. For example, a t_{RCD} specification of 20ns with a 125 MHz clock (8ns period) results in 2.5 clocks, rounded to 3. This is reflected in Figure 11 on page 26, which covers any case where $2 < t_{RCD}(\text{MIN})/t_{CK} \leq 3$. (The same procedure is used to convert other specification limits from time units to clock cycles.)

A subsequent ACTIVE command to a different row in the same bank can only be issued after the previous active row has been “closed” (precharged). The minimum time interval between successive ACTIVE commands to the same bank is defined by t_{RC} .

A subsequent ACTIVE command to another bank can be issued while the first bank is being accessed, which results in a reduction of total row-access overhead. The minimum time interval between successive ACTIVE commands to different banks is defined by t_{RRD} .

Figure 10: Activating a Specific Row in a Specific Bank

READs

READ bursts are initiated with a READ command, as shown in Figure 12 on page 27.

The starting column and bank addresses are provided with the READ command, and auto precharge is either enabled or disabled for that burst access. If auto precharge is enabled, the row being accessed is precharged at the completion of the burst. For the generic READ commands used in the following illustrations, auto precharge is disabled.

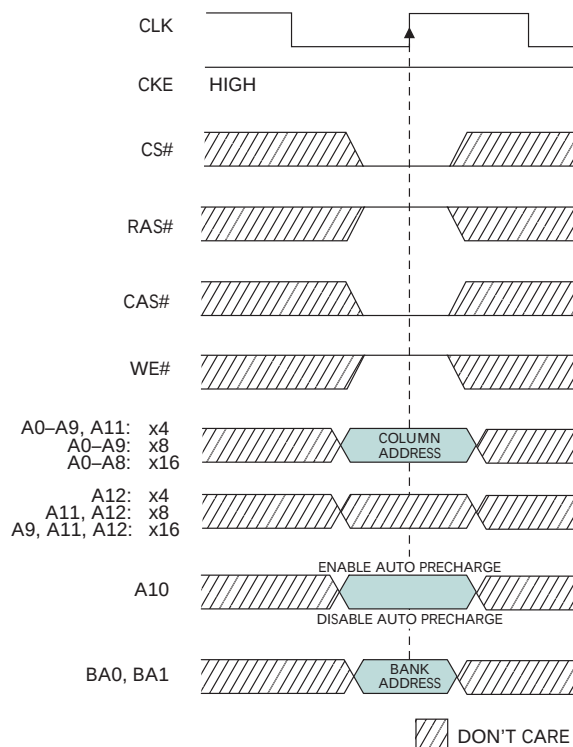
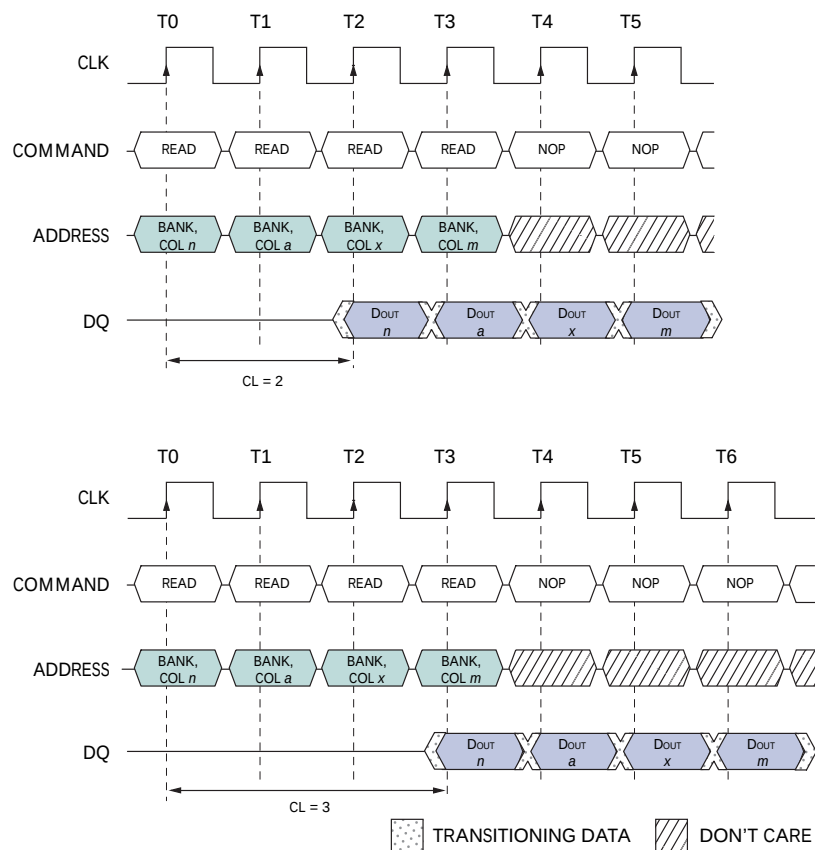


Figure 13: Consecutive READ Bursts

During READ bursts, the valid data-out element from the starting column address will be available following CL after the READ command. Each subsequent data-out element will be valid by the next positive clock edge. Figure 13 on page 28 shows general timing for each possible CL setting.

Upon completion of a burst, assuming no other commands have been initiated, the DQs will go High-Z. A full-page burst will continue until terminated. (At the end of the page, it will wrap to the start address and continue.)

Data from any READ burst may be truncated with a subsequent READ command, and data from a fixed-length READ burst may be immediately followed by data from a READ command. In either case, a continuous flow of data can be maintained. The first data element from the new burst follows either the last element of a completed burst or the last desired data element of a longer burst that is being truncated. The new READ command should be issued x cycles before the clock edge at which the last desired data element is valid, where $x = CL - 1$.

This is shown in Figure 13 on page 28 for $CL = 2$ and $CL = 3$; data element $n + 3$ is either the last of a burst of four or the last desired of a longer burst. The 256Mb SDRAM uses a pipelined architecture and therefore does not require the $2n$ rule associated with a prefetch architecture. A READ command can be initiated on any clock cycle following a previous READ command. Full-speed random read accesses can be performed to the same bank, as shown in Figure 14 on page 29, or each subsequent READ may be performed to a different bank.

Figure 12: READ Command

Figure 14: Random READ Accesses


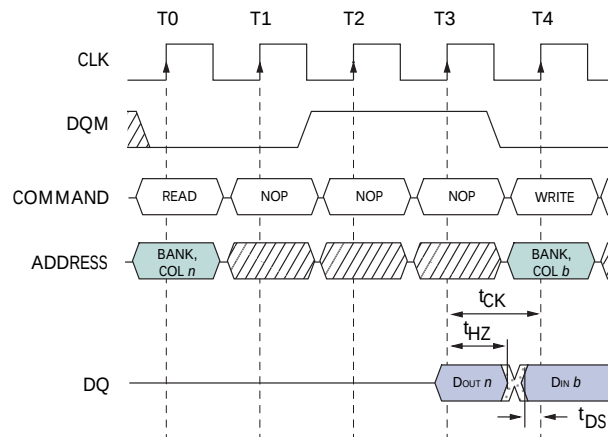
Note: Each READ command may be to any bank. DQM is LOW.

Data from any READ burst may be truncated with a subsequent WRITE command, and data from a fixed-length READ burst may be immediately followed by data from a WRITE command (subject to bus turnaround limitations). The WRITE burst may be initiated on the clock edge immediately following the last (or last desired) data element from the READ burst, provided that I/O contention can be avoided. In a given system design, there may be a possibility that the device driving the input data will go Low-Z before the SDRAM DQs go High-Z. In this case, at least a single-cycle delay should occur between the last read data and the WRITE command.

The DQM input is used to avoid I/O contention, as shown in Figure 15 and Figure 16 on page 30. The DQM signal must be asserted (HIGH) at least two clocks prior to the WRITE command (DQM latency is two clocks for output buffers) to suppress data-out from the READ. Once the WRITE command is registered, the DQs will go High-Z (or remain High-Z), regardless of the state of the DQM signal; provided the DQM was active on the clock just prior to the WRITE command that truncated the READ command. If not, the second WRITE will be an invalid WRITE. For example, if DQM was LOW during T4 in Figure 11 on page 26, then the WRITES at T5 and T7 would be valid, while the WRITE at T6 would be invalid.

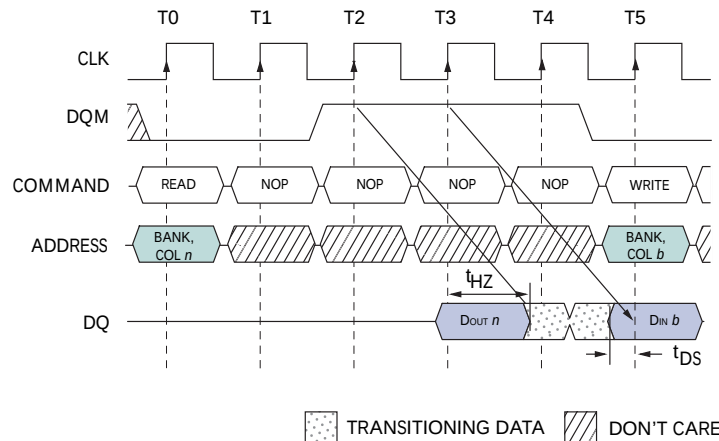
The DQM signal must be de-asserted prior to the WRITE command (DQM latency is zero clocks for input buffers) to ensure that the written data is not masked. Figure 10 on page 26 shows the case where the clock frequency allows for bus contention to be avoided without adding a NOP cycle, and Figure 16 shows the case where the additional NOP is needed.

Note: CL = 3 is used for illustration. The READ command may be to any bank, and the WRITE command may be to any bank.

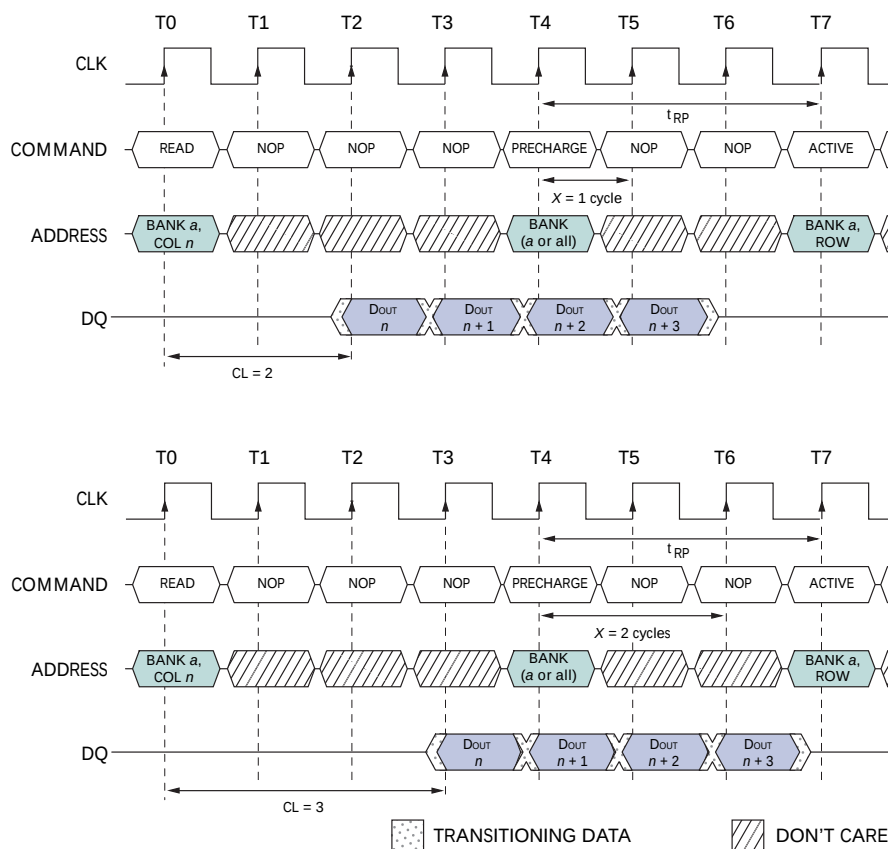
A fixed-length READ burst may be followed by, or truncated with, a PRECHARGE command to the same bank (provided that auto precharge was not activated), and a full-page burst may be truncated with a PRECHARGE command to the same bank. The PRECHARGE command should be issued x cycles before the clock edge at which the last desired data element is valid, where $x = CL - 1$. This is shown in Figure 17 on page 31 for each possible CL; data element $n + 3$ is either the last of a burst of four or the last desired

of a longer burst. Following the PRECHARGE command, a subsequent command to the same bank cannot be issued until t_{RP} is met. Note that part of the row precharge time is hidden during the access of the last data element(s).

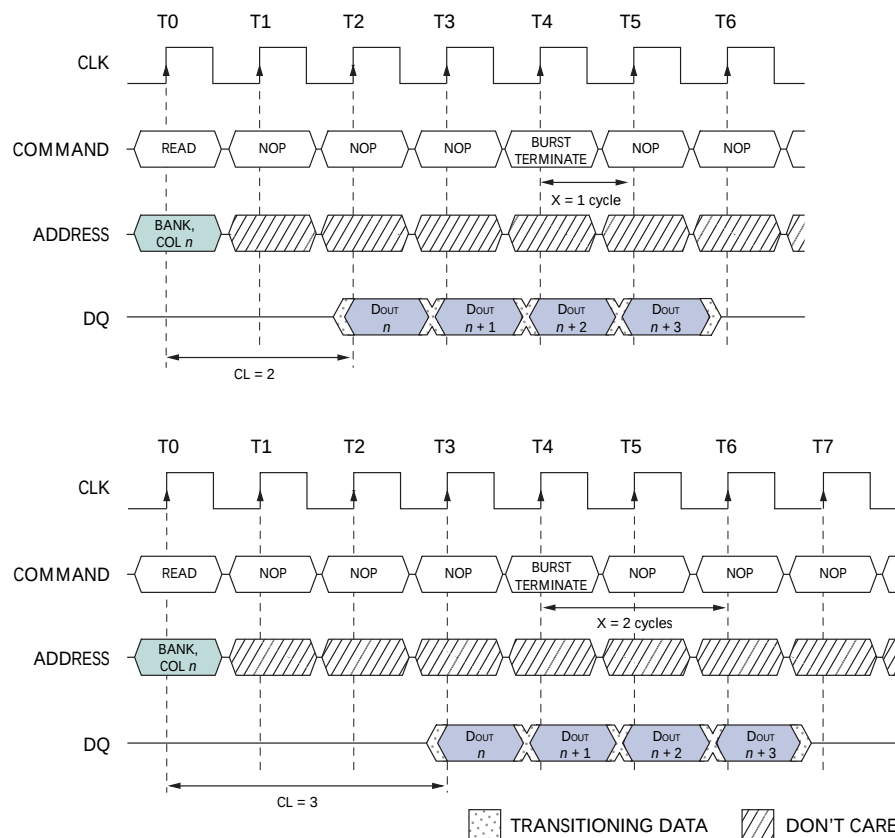
In the case of a fixed-length burst being executed to completion, a PRECHARGE command issued at the optimum time (as described above) provides the same operation that would result from the same fixed-length burst with auto precharge. The disadvantage of the PRECHARGE command is that it requires command and address buses to be available at the appropriate time to issue the command; the advantage of the PRECHARGE command is that it can be used to truncate fixed-length or full-page bursts.

Full-page READ bursts can be truncated with the BURST TERMINATE command, and fixed-length READ bursts may be truncated with a BURST TERMINATE command, provided that auto precharge was not activated. The BURST TERMINATE command should be issued x cycles before the clock edge at which the last desired data element is valid, where $x = CL - 1$. This is shown in Figure 18 on page 32 for each possible CL; data element $n + 3$ is the last desired data element of a longer burst.

WRITES

WRITE bursts are initiated with a WRITE command, as shown in Figure 19 on page 33.

The starting column and bank addresses are provided with the WRITE command, and auto precharge is either enabled or disabled for that access. If auto precharge is enabled, the row being accessed is precharged at the completion of the burst. For the generic WRITE commands used in the following illustrations, auto precharge is disabled.

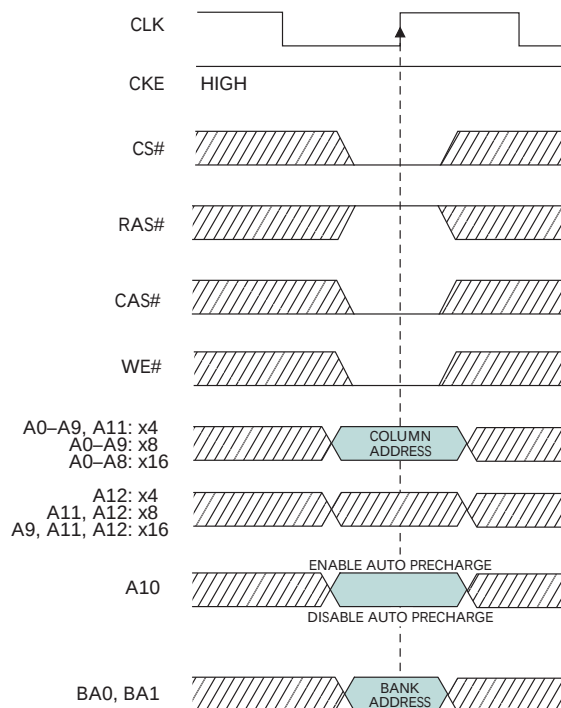
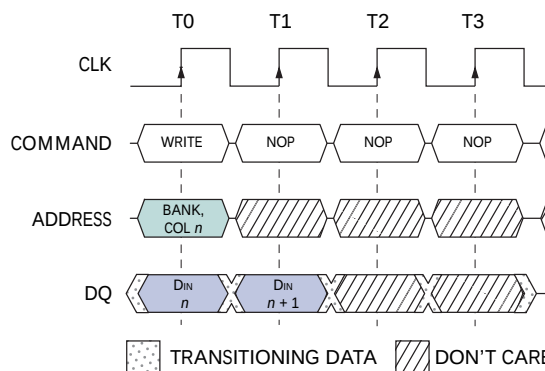


Figure 20: WRITE Burst

During WRITE bursts, the first valid data-in element will be registered coincident with the WRITE command. Subsequent data elements will be registered on each successive positive clock edge. Upon completion of a fixed-length burst, assuming no other commands have been initiated, the DQs will remain High-Z, and any additional input data will be ignored (see Figure 20 on page 33). A full-page burst will continue until terminated. (At the end of the page, it will wrap to the start address and continue.)

Figure 19: WRITE Command

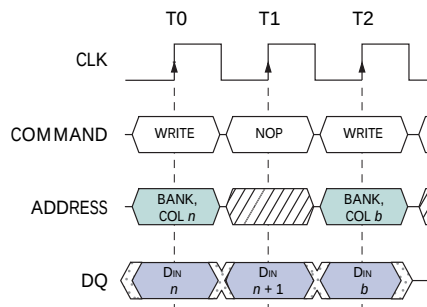

Data for any WRITE burst may be truncated with a subsequent WRITE command, and data for a fixed-length WRITE burst may be immediately followed by data for a WRITE command. The new WRITE command can be issued on any clock following the previous WRITE command, and the data provided coincident with the new command applies to the new command. An example is shown in Figure 21 on page 34. Data $n + 1$ is either the last of a burst of two or the last desired of a longer burst. The 256Mb SDRAM uses a pipelined architecture and therefore does not require the $2n$ rule associated with a prefetch architecture. A WRITE command can be initiated on any clock cycle following a previous WRITE command. Full-speed random write accesses within a page can be performed to the same bank, as shown in Figure 22 on page 34, or each subsequent WRITE may be performed to a different bank.

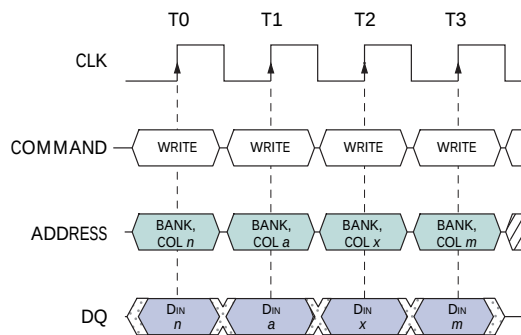
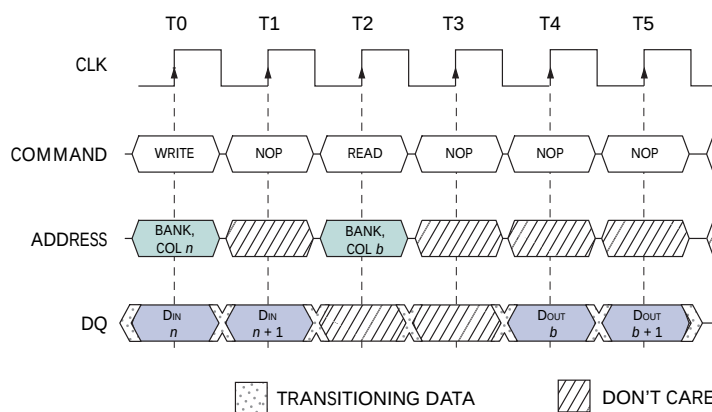


Figure 23: WRITE-to-READ

Data for any WRITE burst may be truncated with a subsequent READ command, and data for a fixed-length WRITE burst may be immediately followed by a READ command. After the READ command is registered, the data inputs will be ignored, and WRITES will not be executed. An example is shown in Figure 23. Data $n + 1$ is either the last of a burst or the last desired of a longer burst.

Figure 22: Random WRITE Cycles

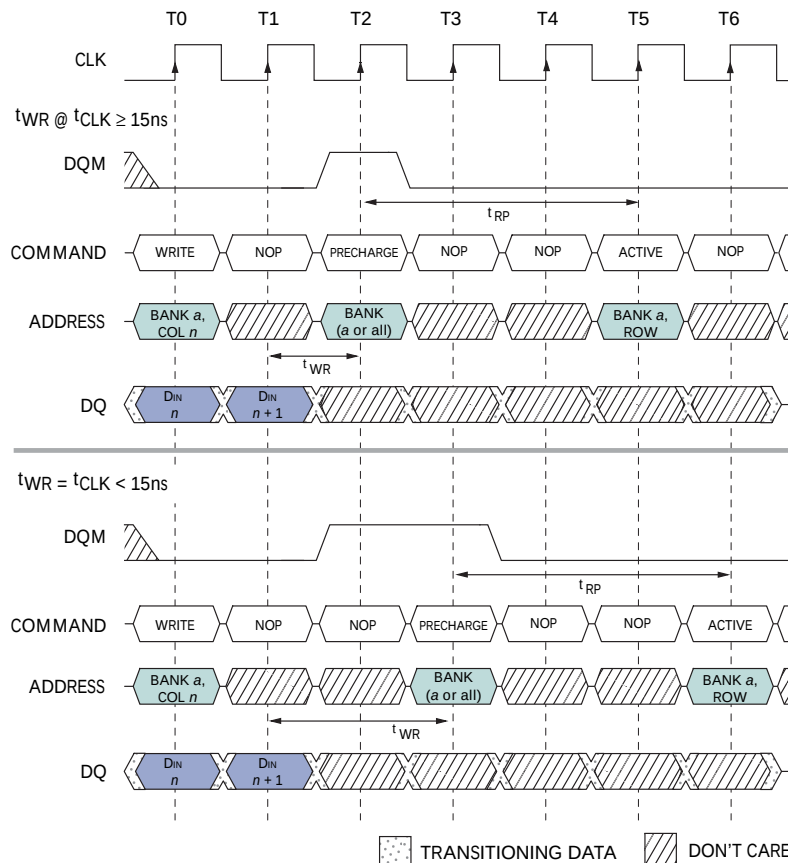
Data for a fixed-length WRITE burst may be followed by, or truncated with, a PRECHARGE command to the same bank (provided that auto precharge was not activated), and a full-page WRITE burst may be truncated with a PRECHARGE command to the same bank. The PRECHARGE command should be issued t_{WR} after the clock edge at

which the last desired input data element is registered. The auto precharge mode requires a t_{WR} of at least one clock plus time, regardless of frequency. In addition, when truncating a WRITE burst, the DQM signal must be used to mask input data for the clock edge prior to, and the clock edge coincident with, the PRECHARGE command. An example is shown in Figure 24. Data $n + 1$ is either the last of a burst of two or the last desired of a longer burst. Following the PRECHARGE command, a subsequent command to the same bank cannot be issued until t_{RP} is met. The PRECHARGE is issued coincident with the second clock (see Figure 24).

In the case of a fixed-length burst being executed to completion, a PRECHARGE command issued at the optimum time (as described above) provides the same operation that would result from the same fixed-length burst with auto precharge. The disadvantage of the PRECHARGE command is that it requires that the command and address buses be available at the appropriate time to issue the command; the advantage of the PRECHARGE command is that it can be used to truncate fixed-length or full-page bursts.

Fixed-length or full-page WRITE bursts can be truncated with the BURST TERMINATE command. When truncating a WRITE burst, the input data applied coincident with the BURST TERMINATE command will be ignored. The last data written (provided that DQM is LOW at that time) will be the input data applied one clock previous to the BURST TERMINATE command. This is shown in Figure 9 on page 24, where data n is the last desired data element of a longer burst.

PRECHARGE

The PRECHARGE command (see Figure 25 on page 36) is used to deactivate the open row in a particular bank or the open row in all banks. The bank(s) will be available for a subsequent row access some specified time (t_{RP}) after the PRECHARGE command is issued. Input A10 determines whether one or all banks are to be precharged, and in the case where only one bank is to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 select the bank. When all banks are to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 are treated as “Don’t Care.” After a bank has been precharged, it is in the idle state and must be activated prior to any READ or WRITE commands being issued to that bank.

Power-Down

Power-down occurs if CKE is registered LOW coincident with a NOP or COMMAND INHIBIT when no accesses are in progress. If power-down occurs when all banks are idle, this mode is referred to as precharge power-down; if power-down occurs when there is a row active in any bank, this mode is referred to as active power-down. Entering power-down deactivates the input and output buffers, excluding CKE, for maximum power savings while in standby. The device may not remain in the power-down state longer than the refresh period (t_{REF} or $t_{REF_{AT}}$) since no REFRESH operations are performed in this mode.

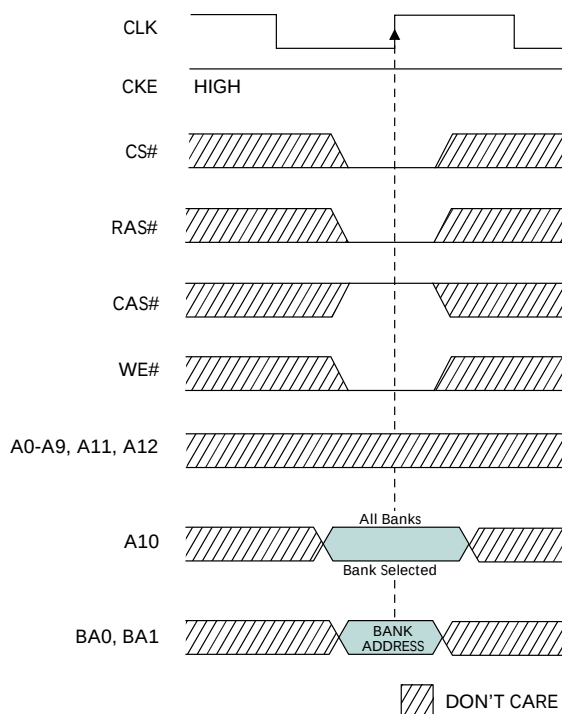
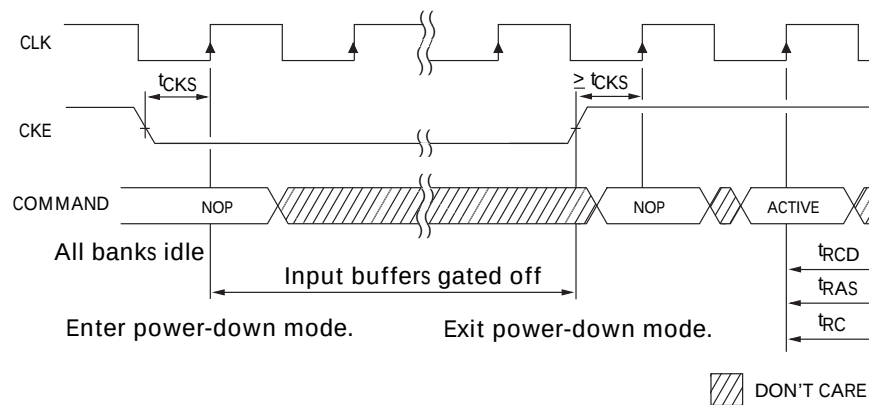


Figure 26: Power-Down

The power-down state is exited by registering a NOP or COMMAND INHIBIT and CKE HIGH at the desired clock edge (meeting t_{CKS}). See Figure 26 on page 37.

Figure 25: PRECHARGE Command

Clock Suspend

The clock suspend mode occurs when a column access/burst is in progress and CKE is registered LOW. In the clock suspend mode, the internal clock is deactivated, “freezing” the synchronous logic.

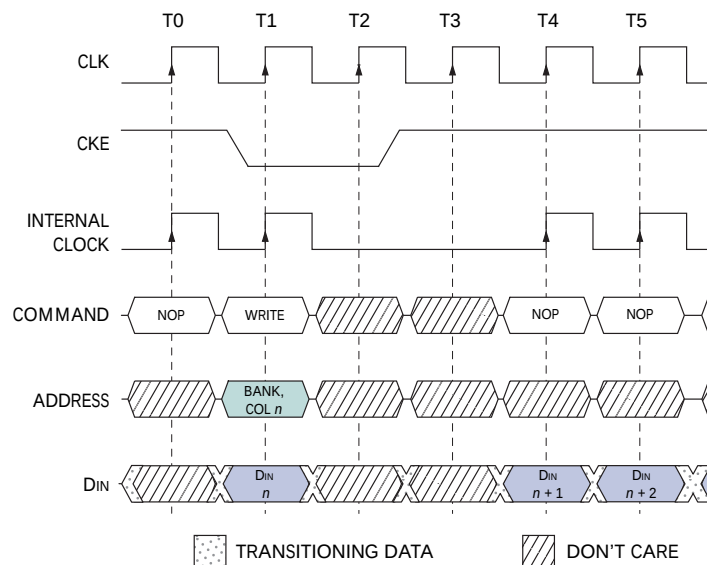
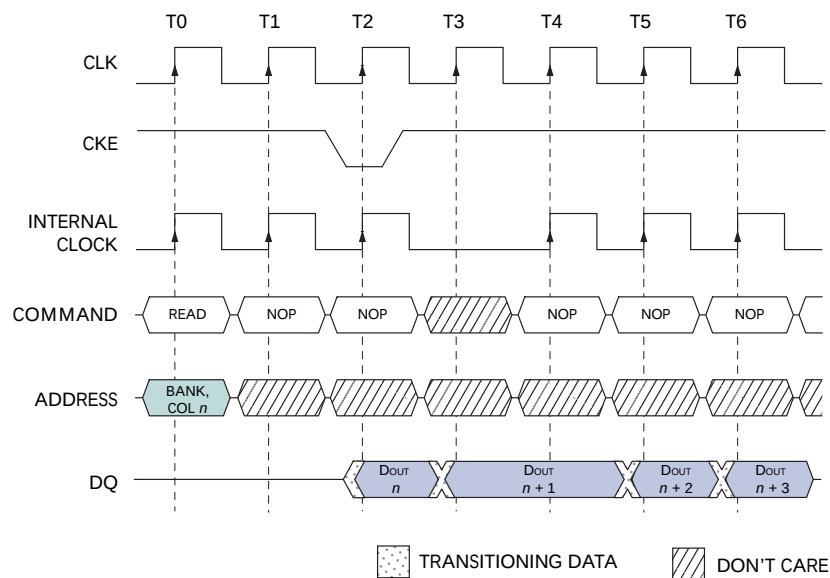
Figure 27: Clock Suspend During WRITE Burst

For each positive clock edge on which CKE is sampled LOW, the next internal positive clock edge is suspended. Any command or data present on the input pins at the time of a suspended internal clock edge is ignored; any data present on the DQ pins remains driven; and burst counters are not incremented, as long as the clock is suspended. (See examples in Figure 27 and Figure 28 on page 38.)

Clock suspend mode is exited by registering CKE HIGH; the internal clock and related operation will resume on the subsequent positive clock edge.

Burst Read/Single Write Mode

The burst read/single write mode is entered by programming the WRITE burst mode bit (M9) in the mode register to a logic 1. In this mode, all WRITE commands result in the access of a single column location (burst of one), regardless of the programmed BL. READ commands access columns according to the programmed BL and sequence, just as in the normal mode of operation (M9 = 0).

Concurrent Auto Precharge

An access command (READ or WRITE) to another bank while an access command with auto precharge enabled is executing is not allowed by SDRAMs, unless the SDRAM supports concurrent auto precharge. Micron SDRAMs support concurrent auto precharge. Four cases where concurrent auto precharge occurs are defined below.

READ with Auto Precharge

- Interrupted by a READ (with or without auto precharge): A READ to bank m will interrupt a READ on bank n , CL later. The precharge to bank n will begin when the READ to bank m is registered (Figure 29 on page 39).

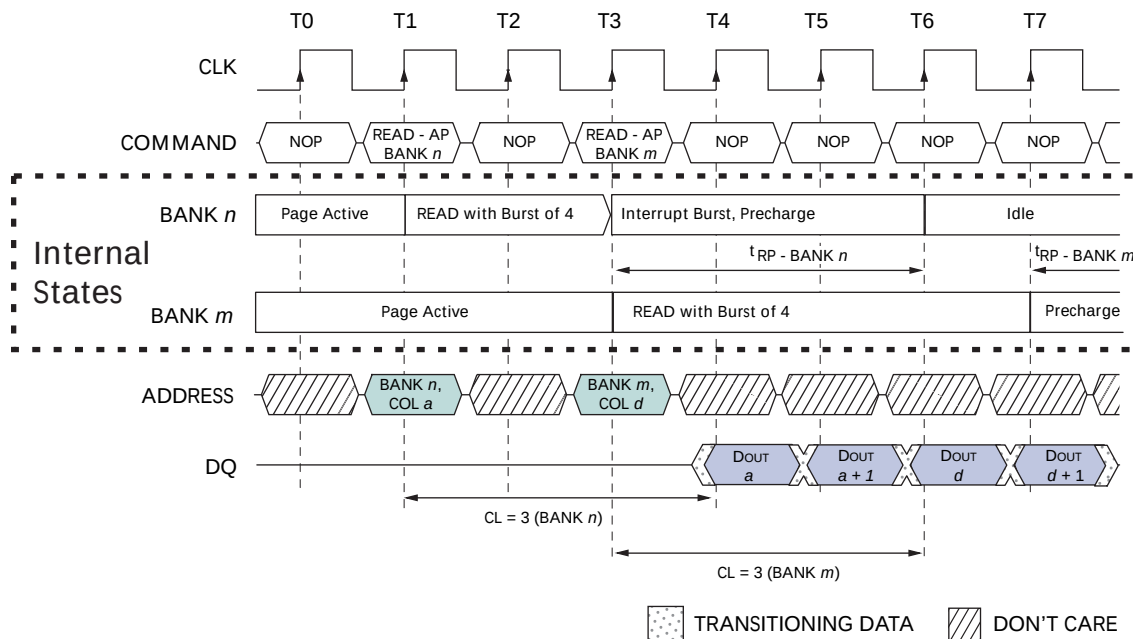


Figure 30: READ With Auto Precharge Interrupted by a WRITE

- Interrupted by a WRITE (with or without auto precharge): A WRITE to bank m will interrupt a READ on bank n when registered. DQM should be used two clocks prior to the WRITE command to prevent bus contention. The precharge to bank n will begin when the WRITE to bank m is registered (Figure 30 on page 39).

WRITE with Auto Precharge

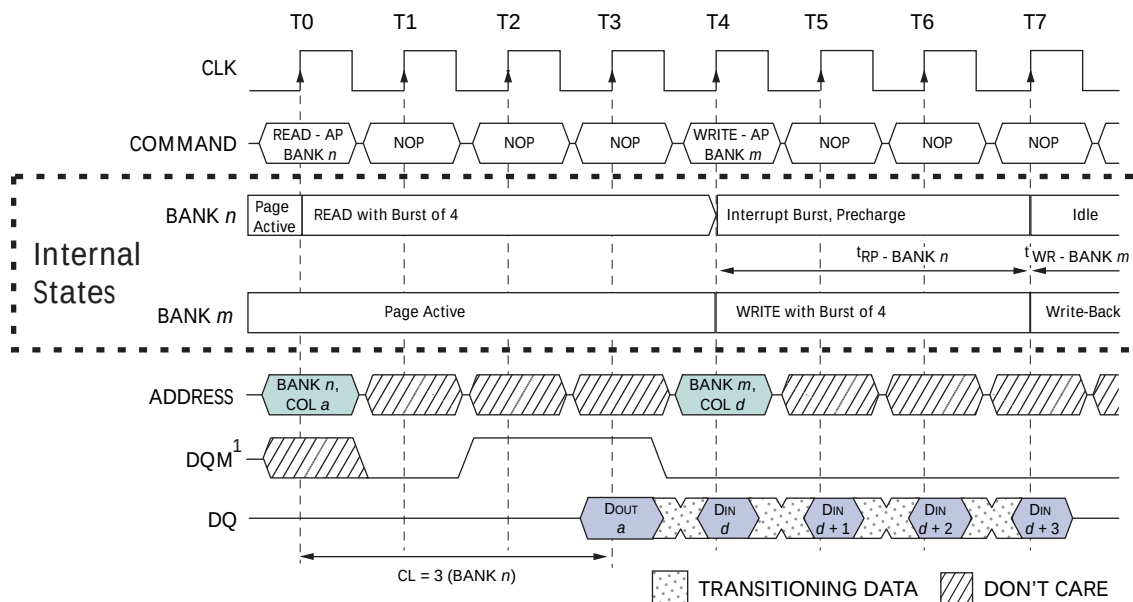
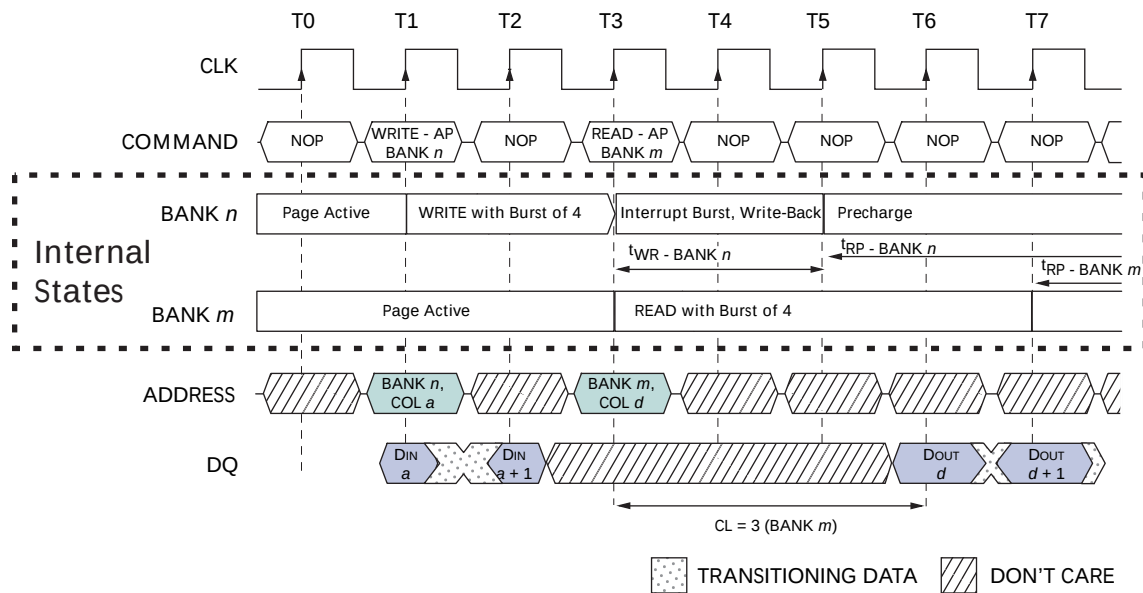
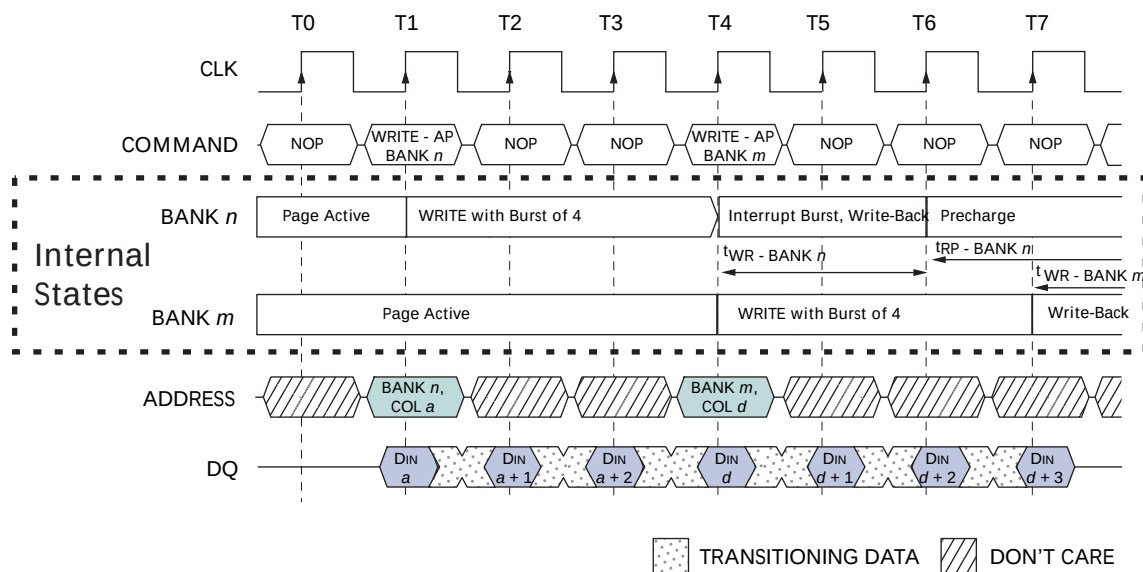


Figure 31: WRITE With Auto Precharge Interrupted by a READ

- Interrupted by a READ (with or without auto precharge): A READ to bank m will interrupt a WRITE on bank n when registered, with the data-out appearing CL later. The precharge to bank n will begin after t_{WR} is met, where t_{WR} begins when the READ to bank m is registered. The last valid WRITE to bank n will be data-in registered one clock prior to the READ to bank m (Figure 31 on page 40).

- Interrupted by a WRITE (with or without auto precharge): A WRITE to bank m will interrupt a WRITE on bank n when registered. The precharge to bank n will begin after t_{WR} is met, where t_{WR} begins when the WRITE to bank m is registered. The last valid data WRITE to bank n will be data registered one clock prior to a WRITE to bank m (Figure 32 on page 40).

Figure 29: READ With Auto Precharge Interrupted by a READ

Temperature and Thermal Impedance

It is imperative that the SDRAM device's temperature specifications, shown in Table 13 on page 47, be maintained to ensure the junction temperature is in the proper operating range to meet data sheet specifications. An important step in maintaining the proper junction temperature is using the device's thermal impedances correctly. The thermal impedances are listed in Table 14 on page 47 for the applicable die revision and packages being made available. These thermal impedance values vary according to the density, package, and particular design used for each device.

Incorrectly using thermal impedances can produce significant errors. Read Micron technical note TN-00-08, "Thermal Applications" prior to using the thermal impedances listed in Table 14. To ensure the compatibility of current and future designs, contact Micron Applications Engineering to confirm thermal impedance values.

The SDRAM device's safe junction temperature range can be maintained when the T_C specification is not exceeded. In applications where the device's ambient temperature is too high, use of forced air and/or heat sinks may be required to satisfy the case temperature specifications.

Figure 33: Example Temperature Test Point Location, 54-Pin TSOP: Top View

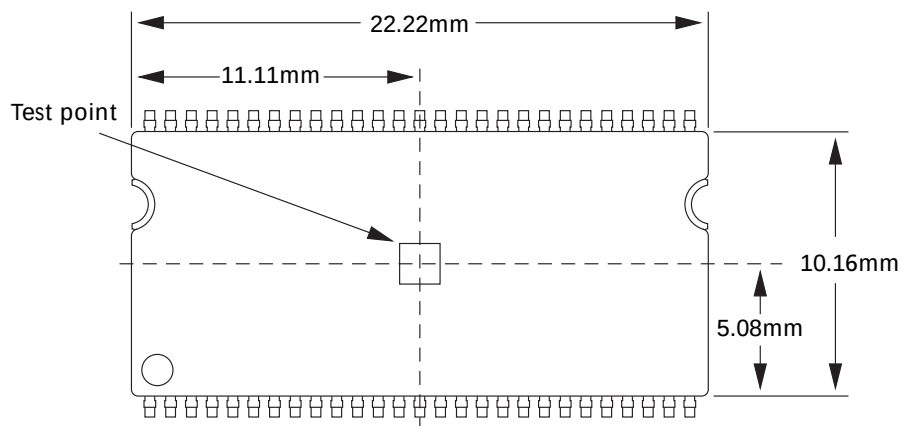


Figure 34: Example Temperature Test Point Location, 54-Ball VFBGA: Top View

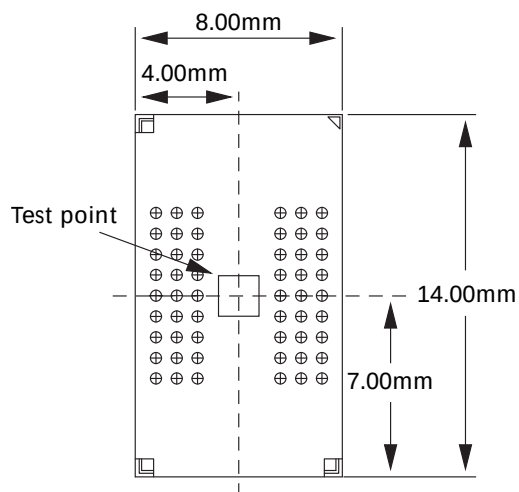


Figure 35: Example Temperature Test Point Location, 60-Ball FBGA: Top View

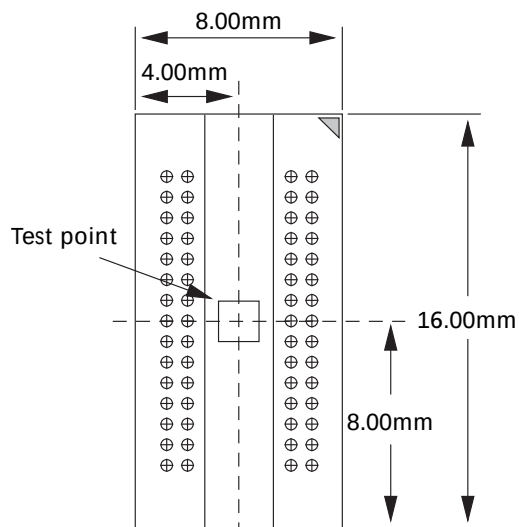

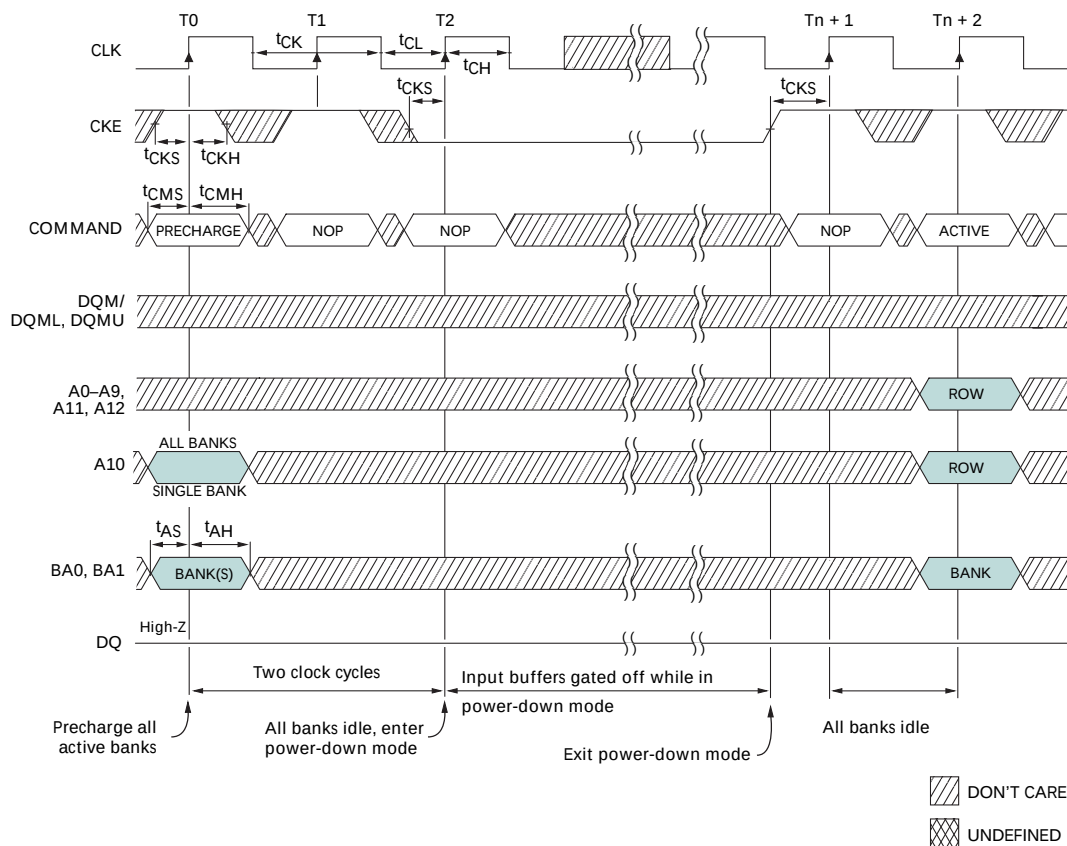

Figure 36: Initialize and Load Mode Register

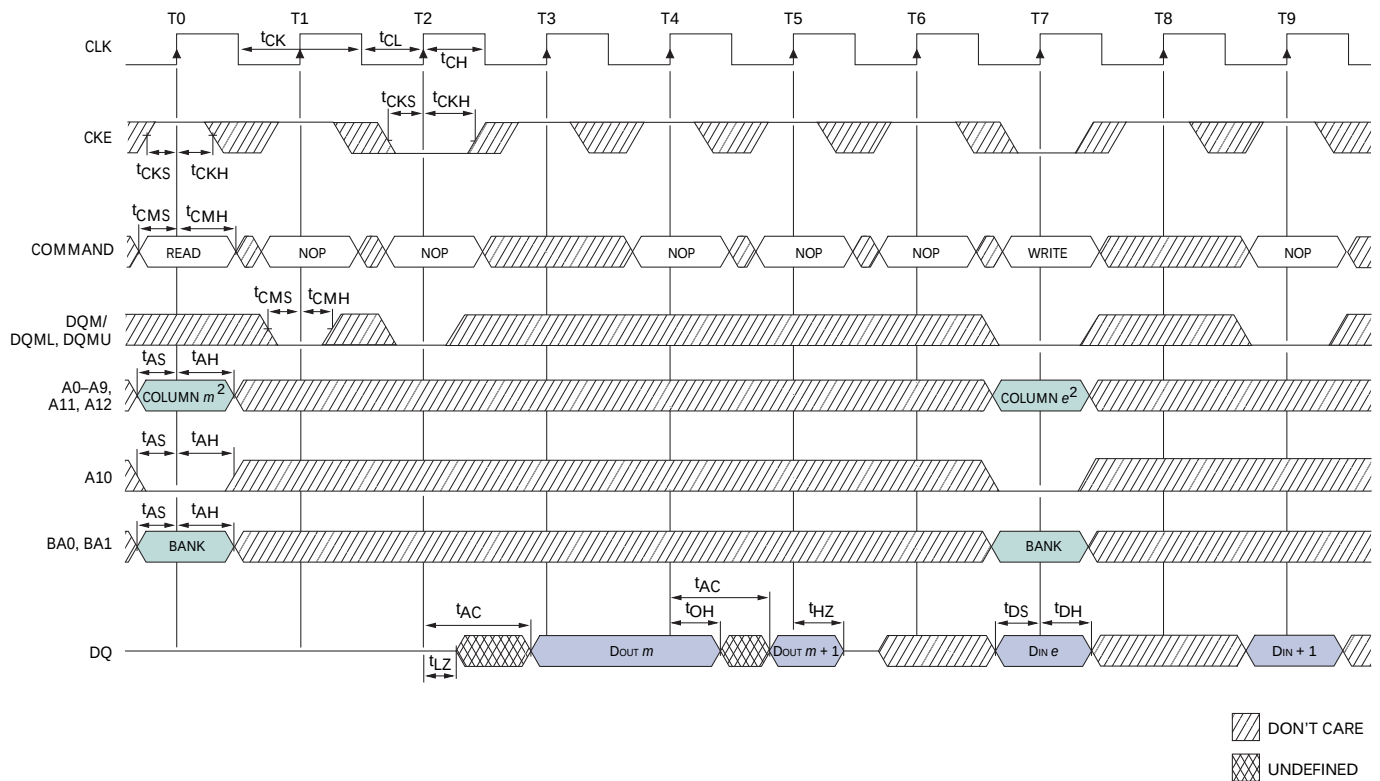

Figure 37: Power-Down Mode

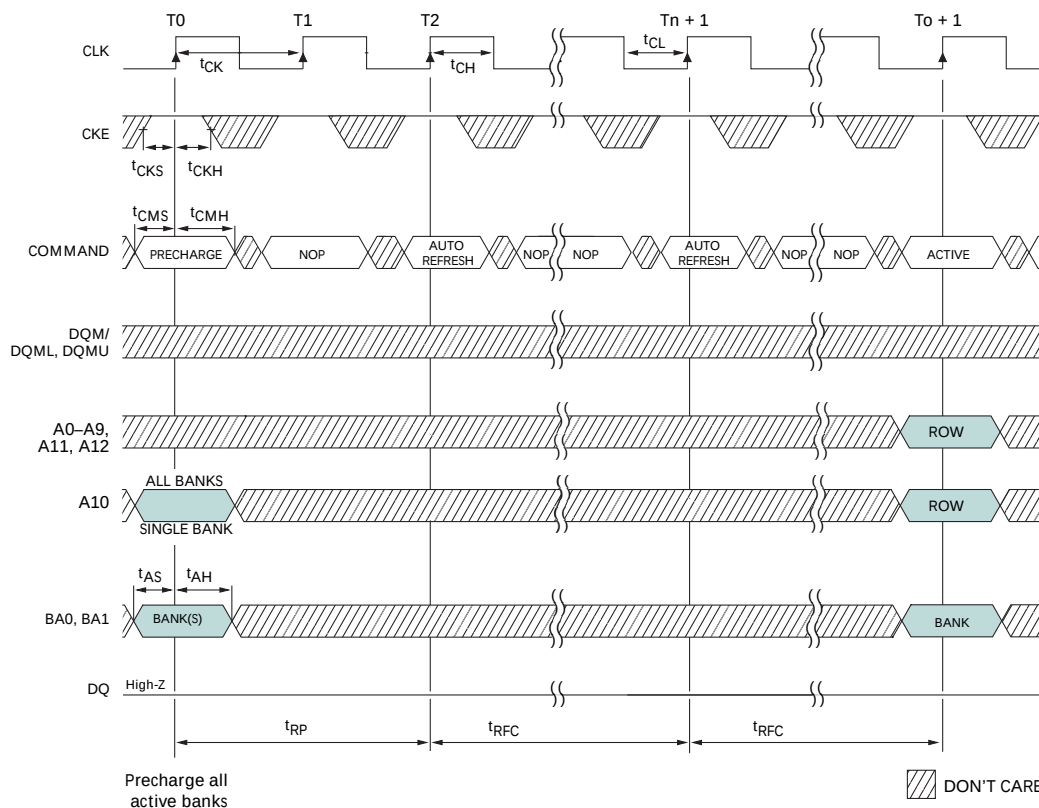

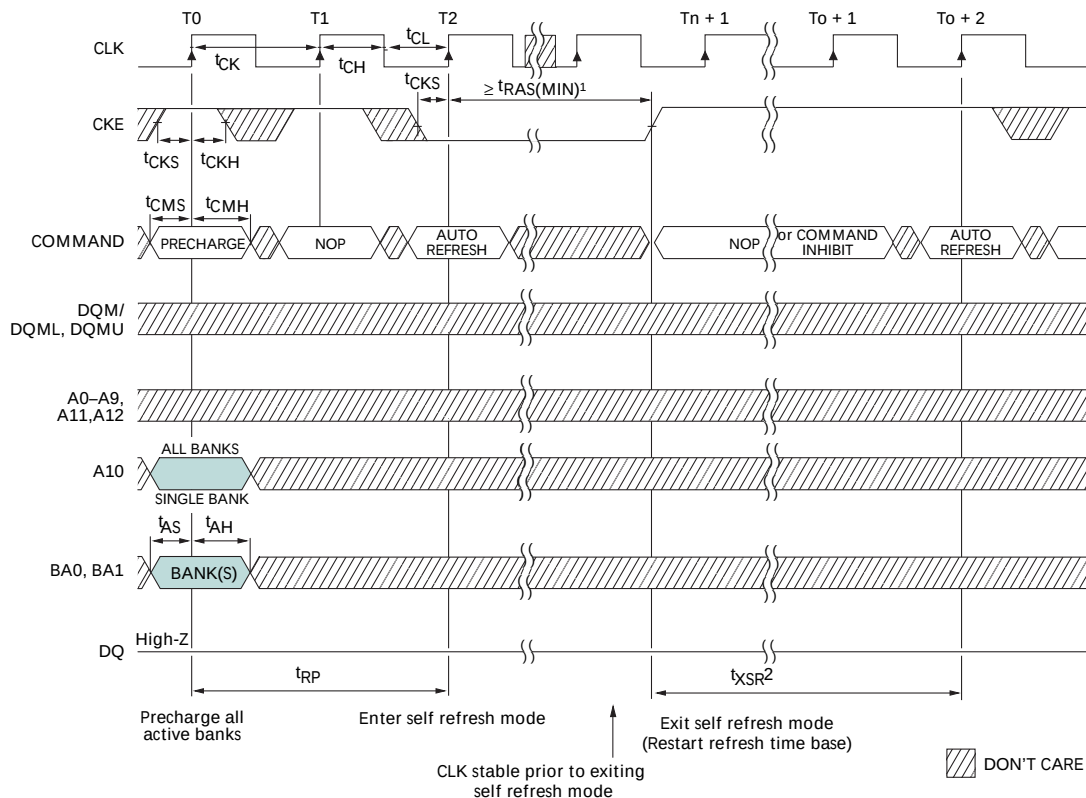
Figure 38: Clock Suspend Mode

Figure 39: Auto Refresh Mode

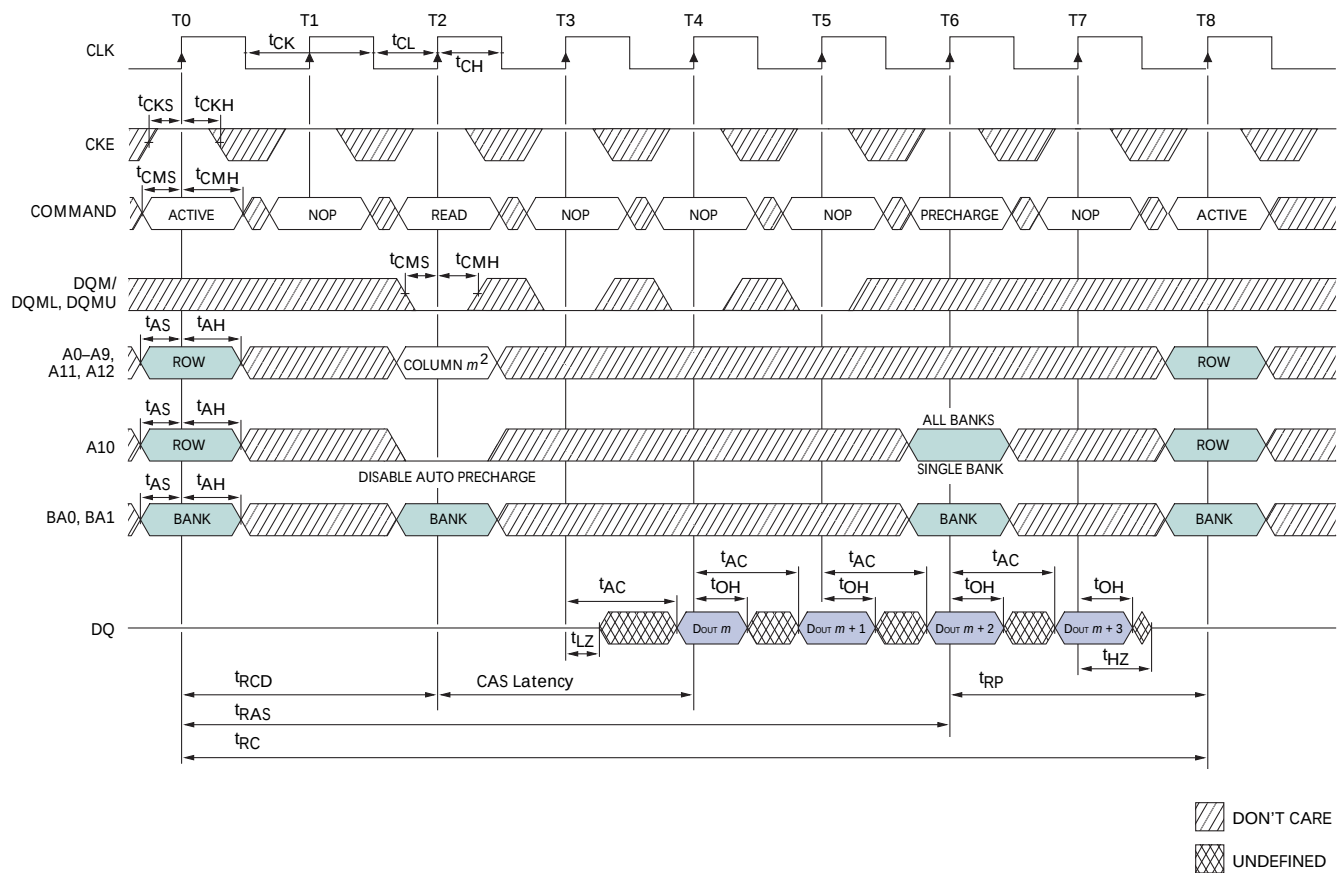

Figure 40: Self Refresh Mode


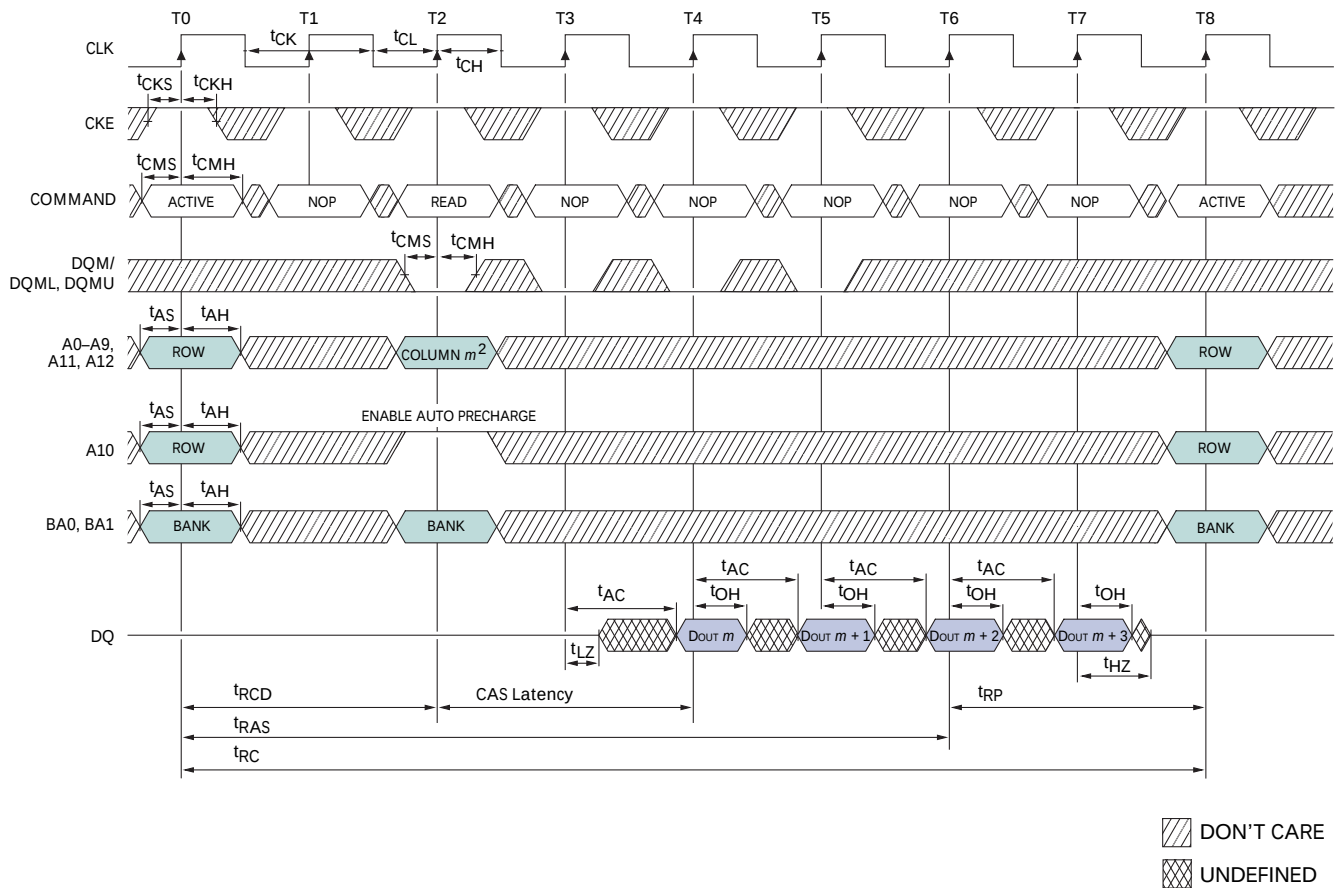

Figure 41: Read – Without Auto Precharge

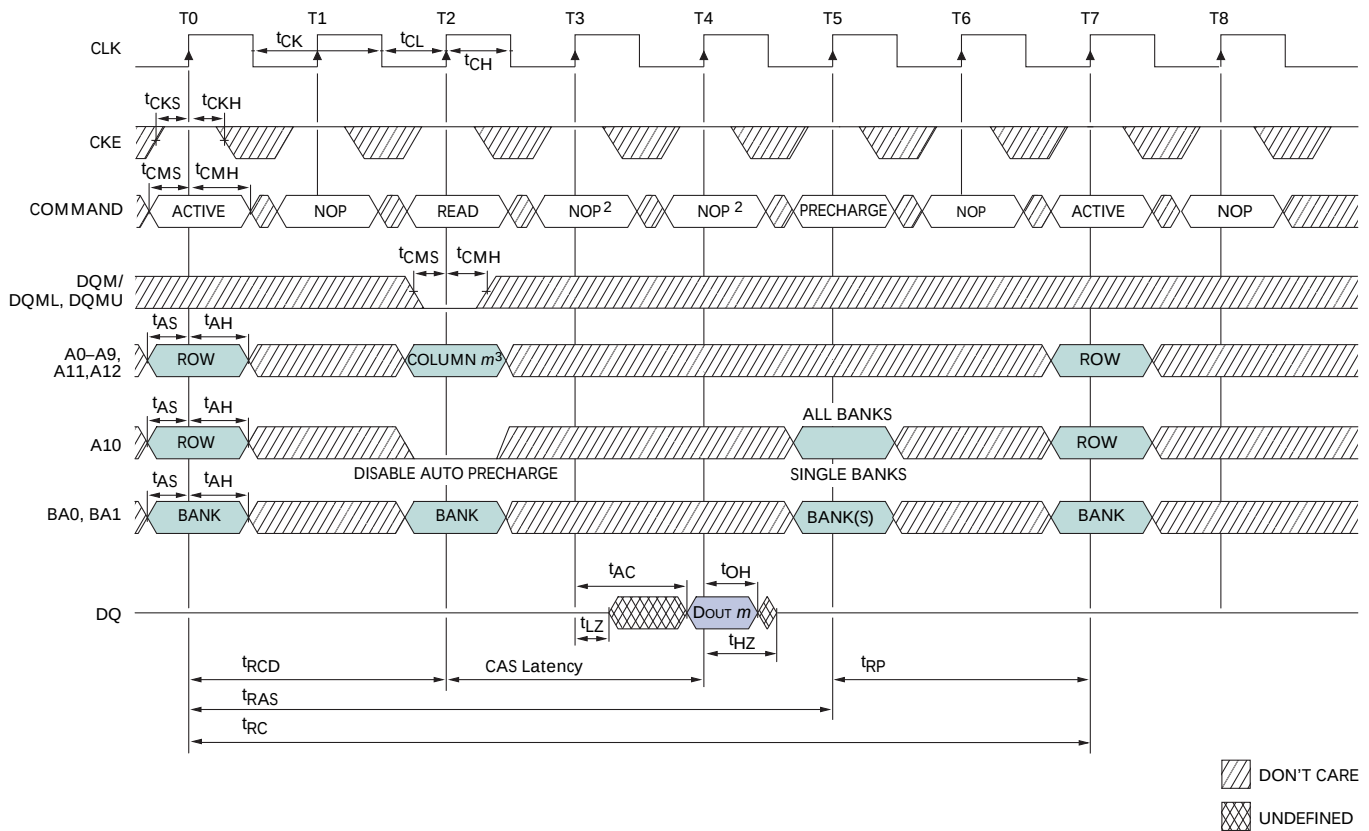

Figure 42: Read – With Auto Precharge

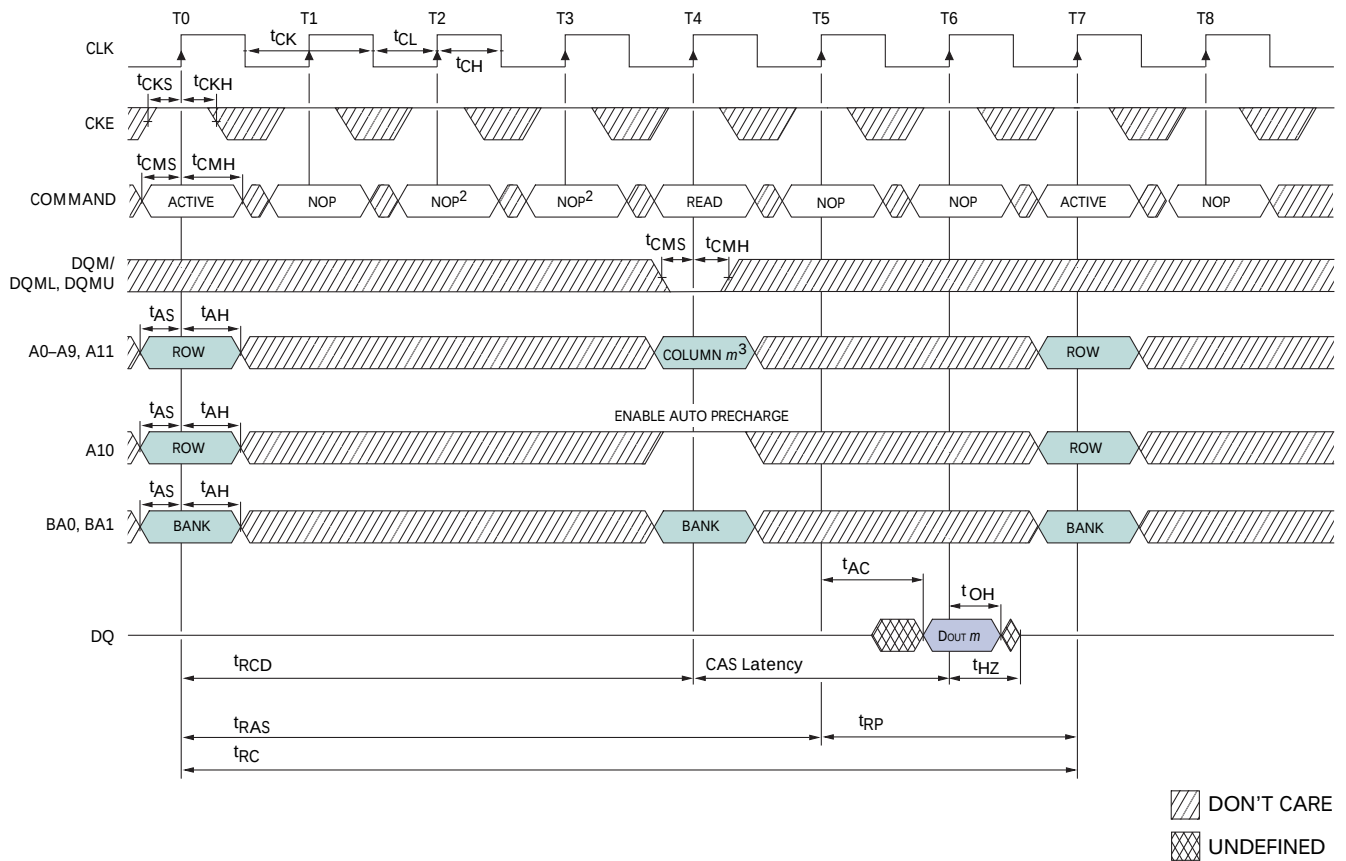

Figure 43: Single Read – Without Auto Precharge


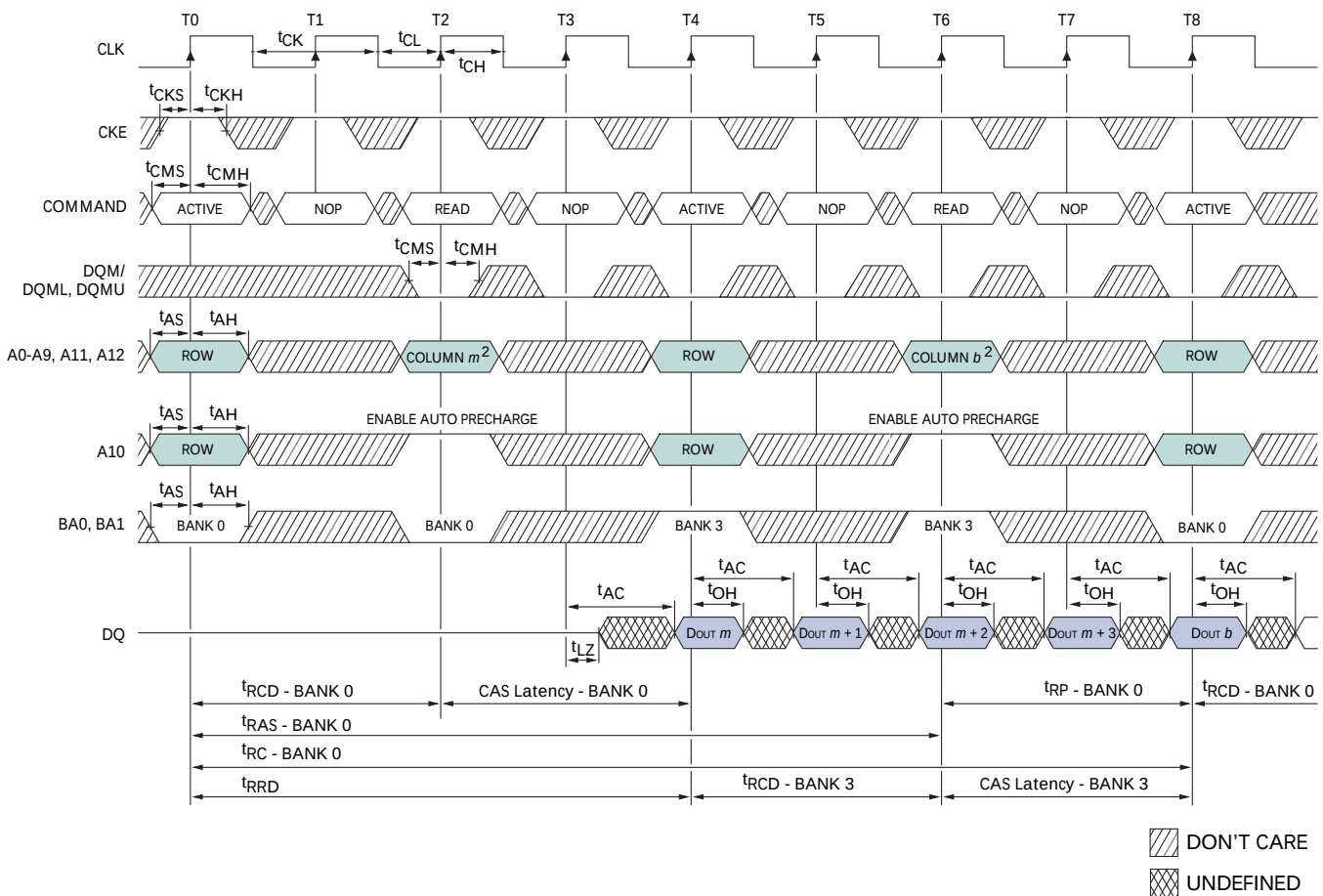

Figure 44: Single Read – With Auto Precharge



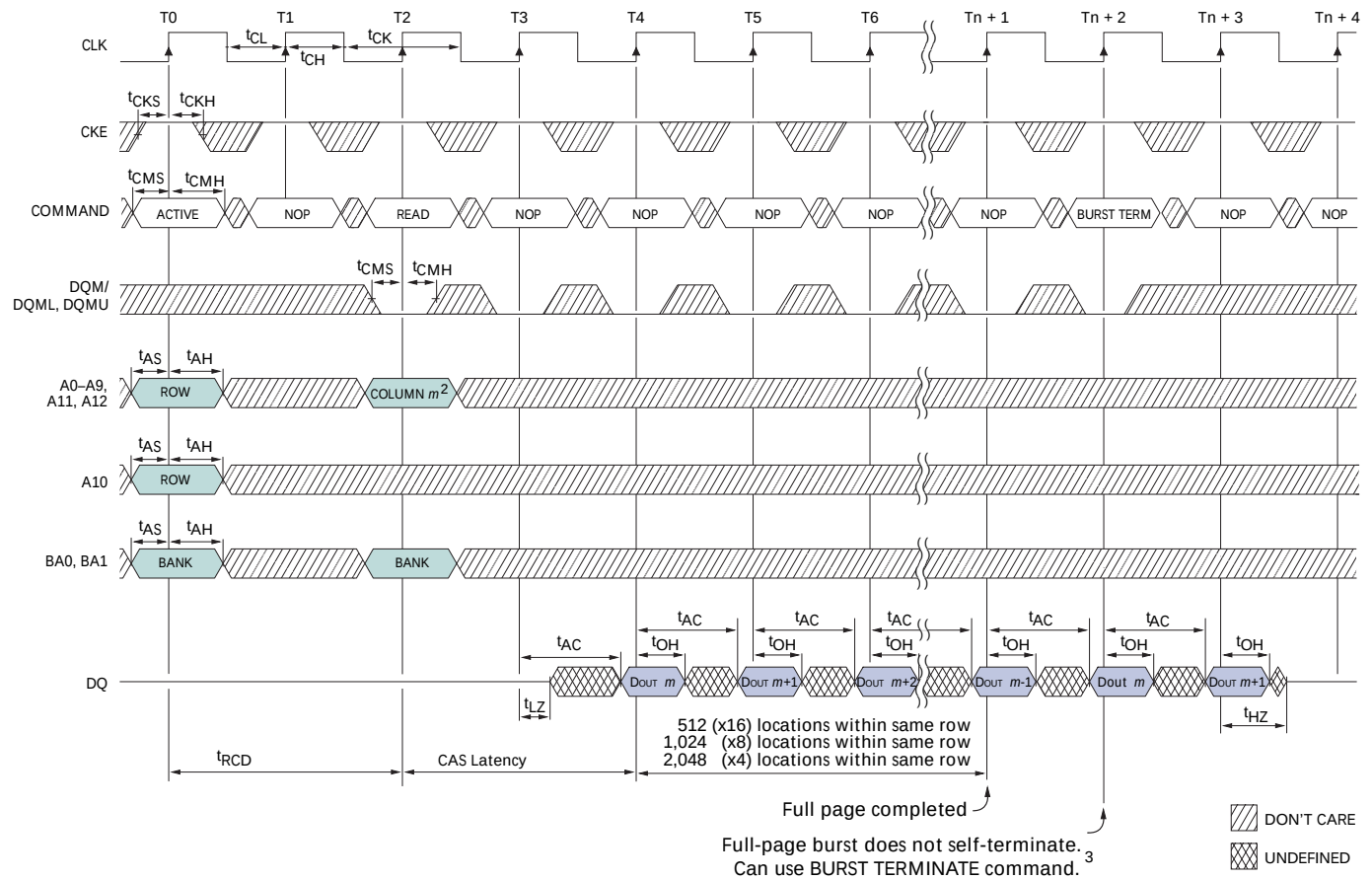

Figure 45: Alternating Bank Read Accesses



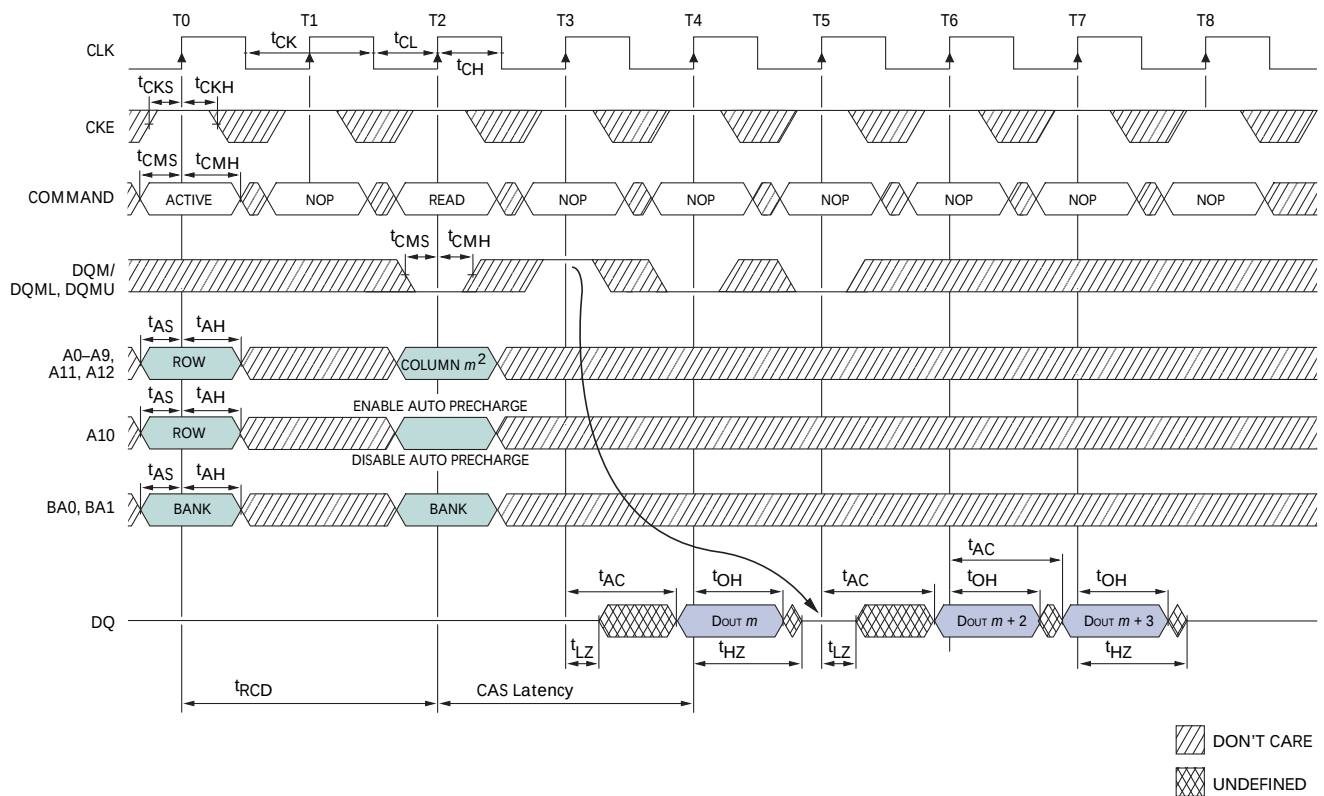

Figure 46: Read – Full-Page Burst



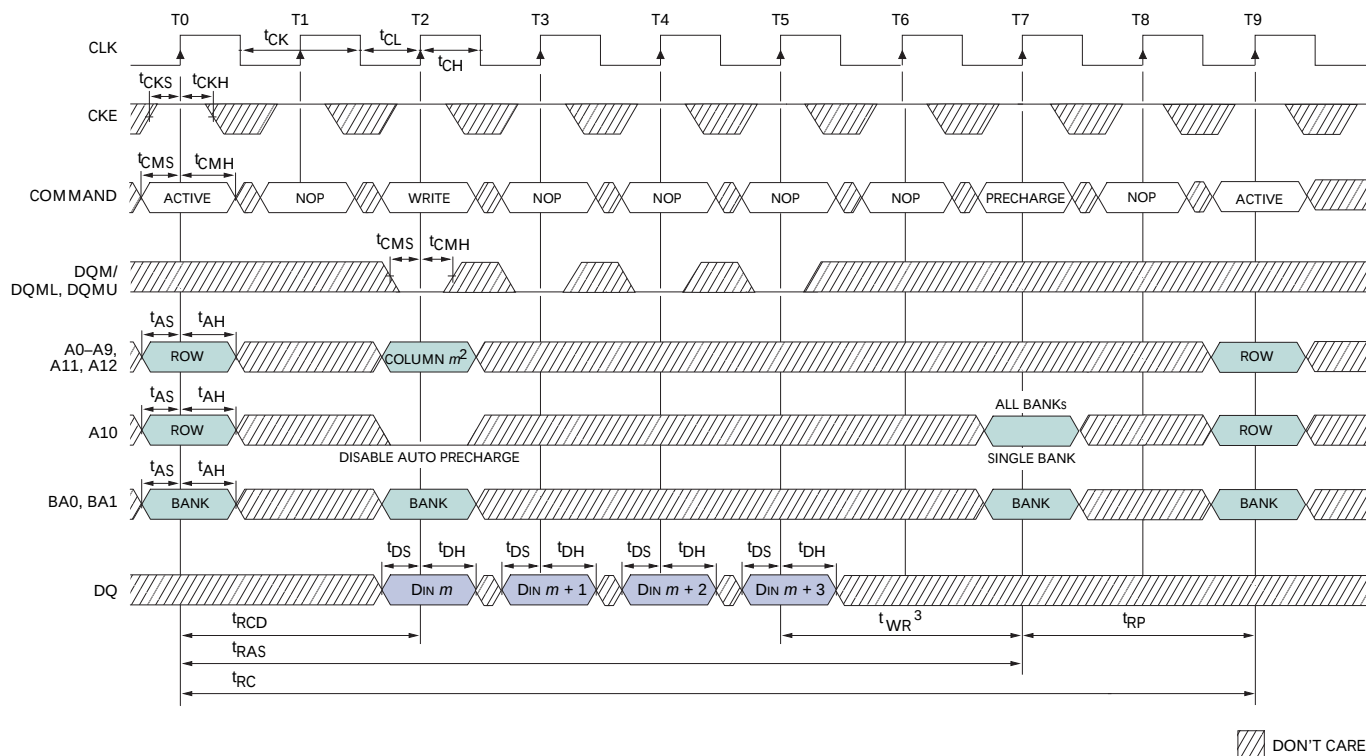

Figure 47: Read – DQM Operation



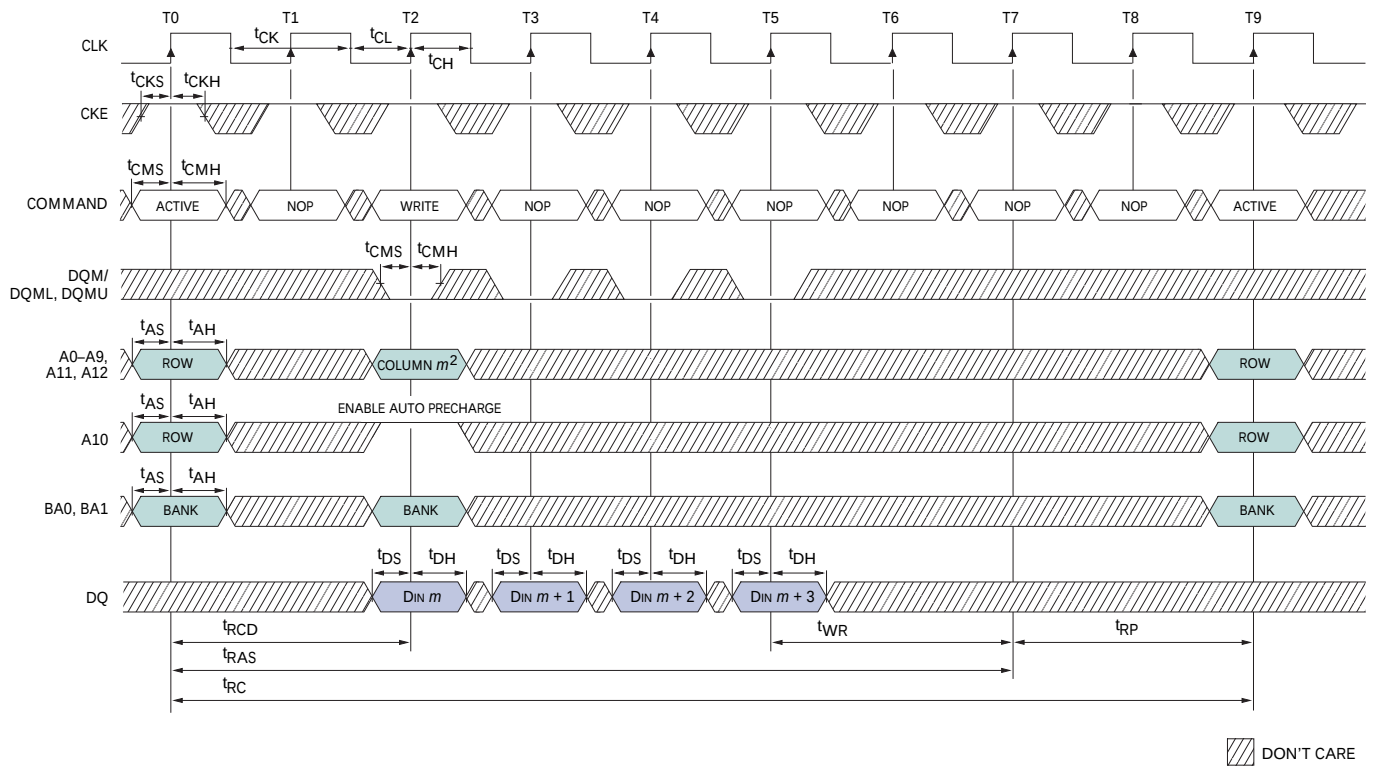

Figure 48: Write – Without Auto Precharge



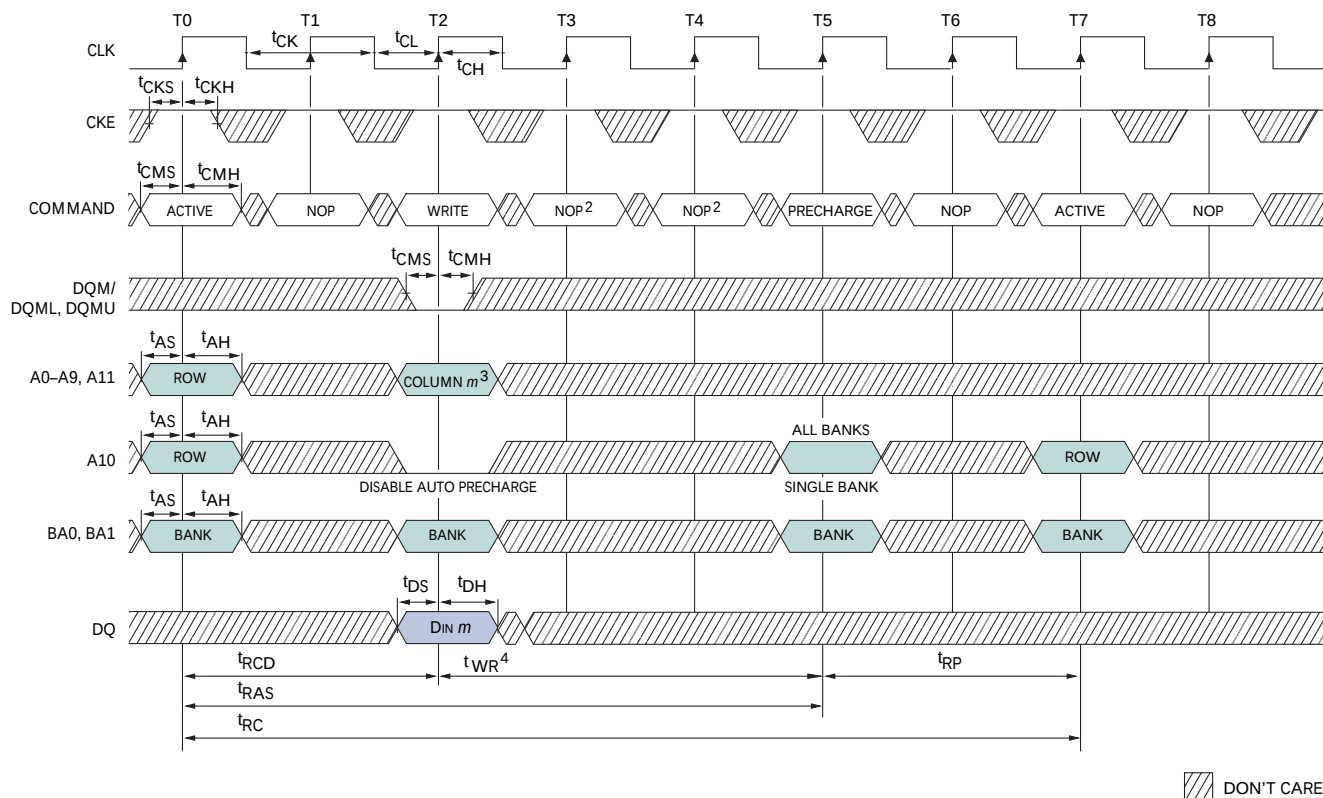

Figure 49: Write – With Auto Precharge

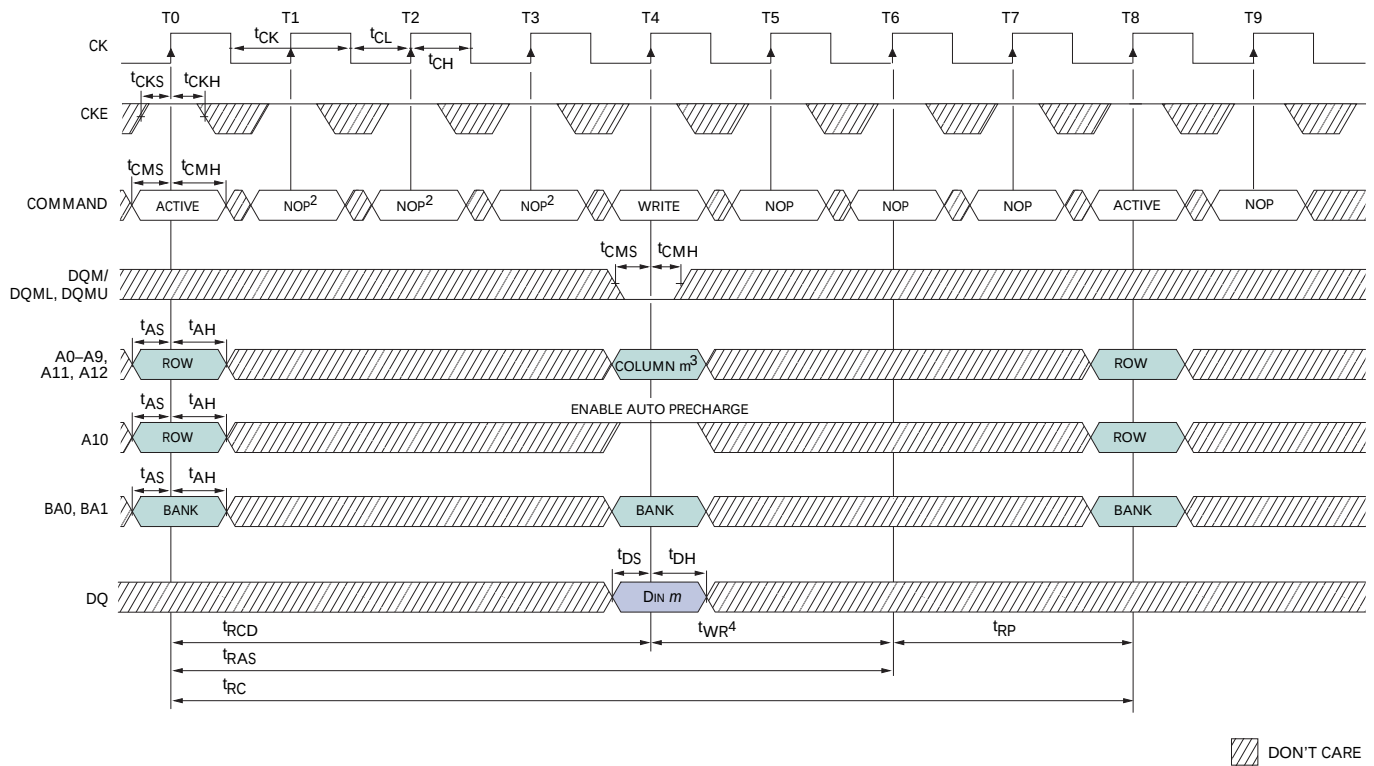

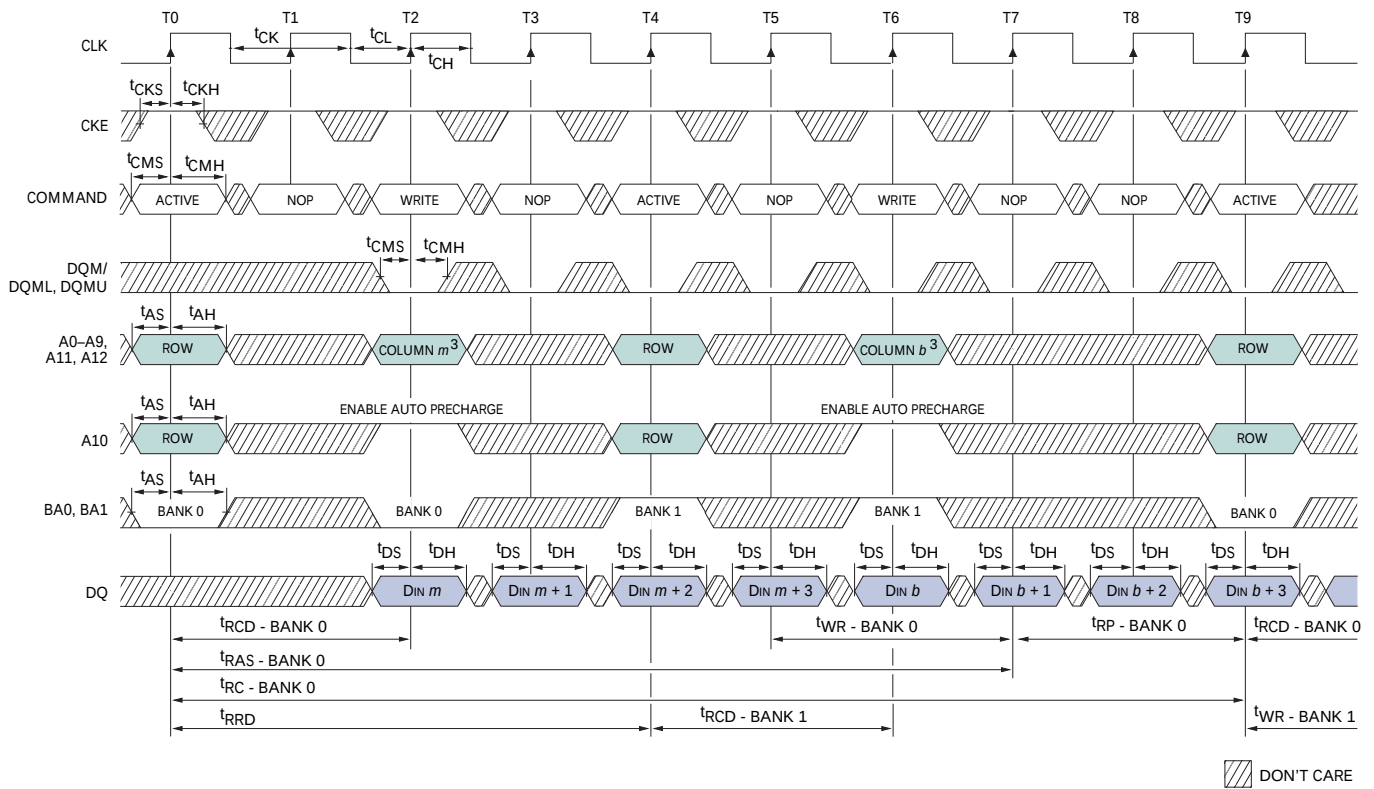
Figure 50: Single Write – Without Auto Precharge

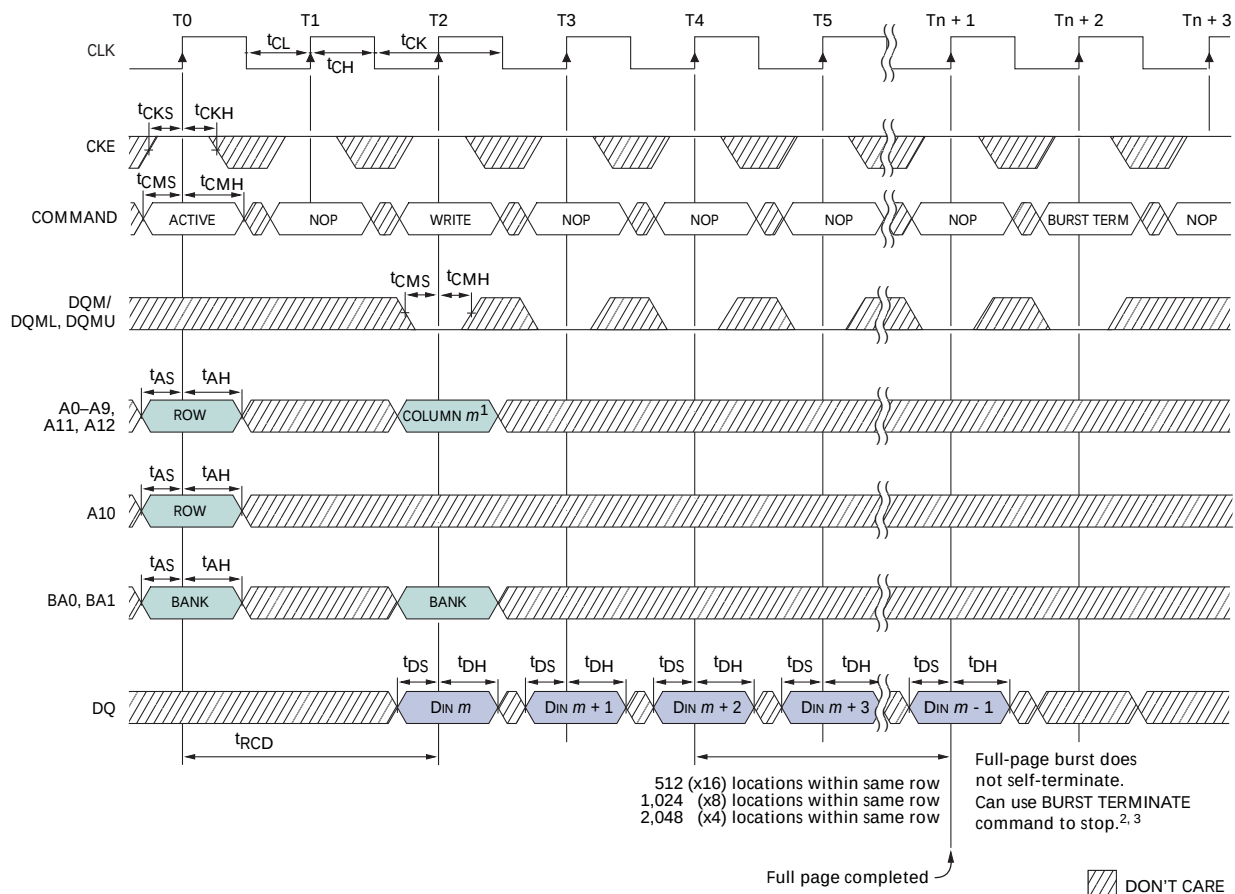
Figure 51: Single Write – With Auto Precharge

Figure 52: Alternating Bank Write Accesses


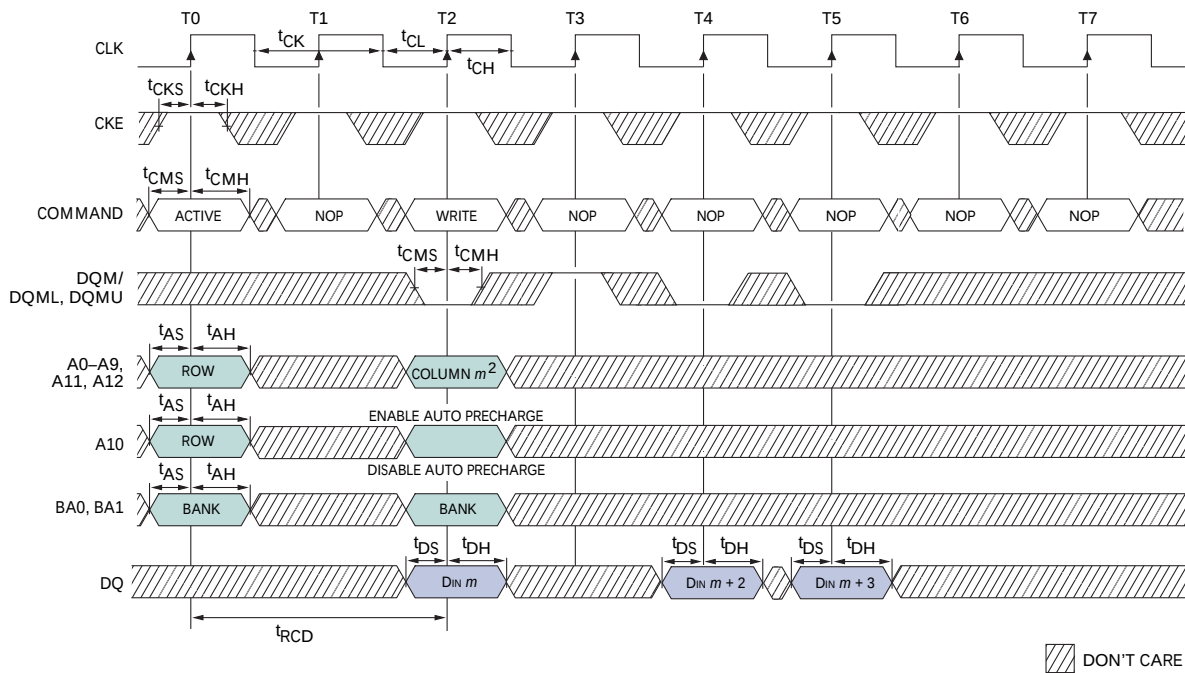

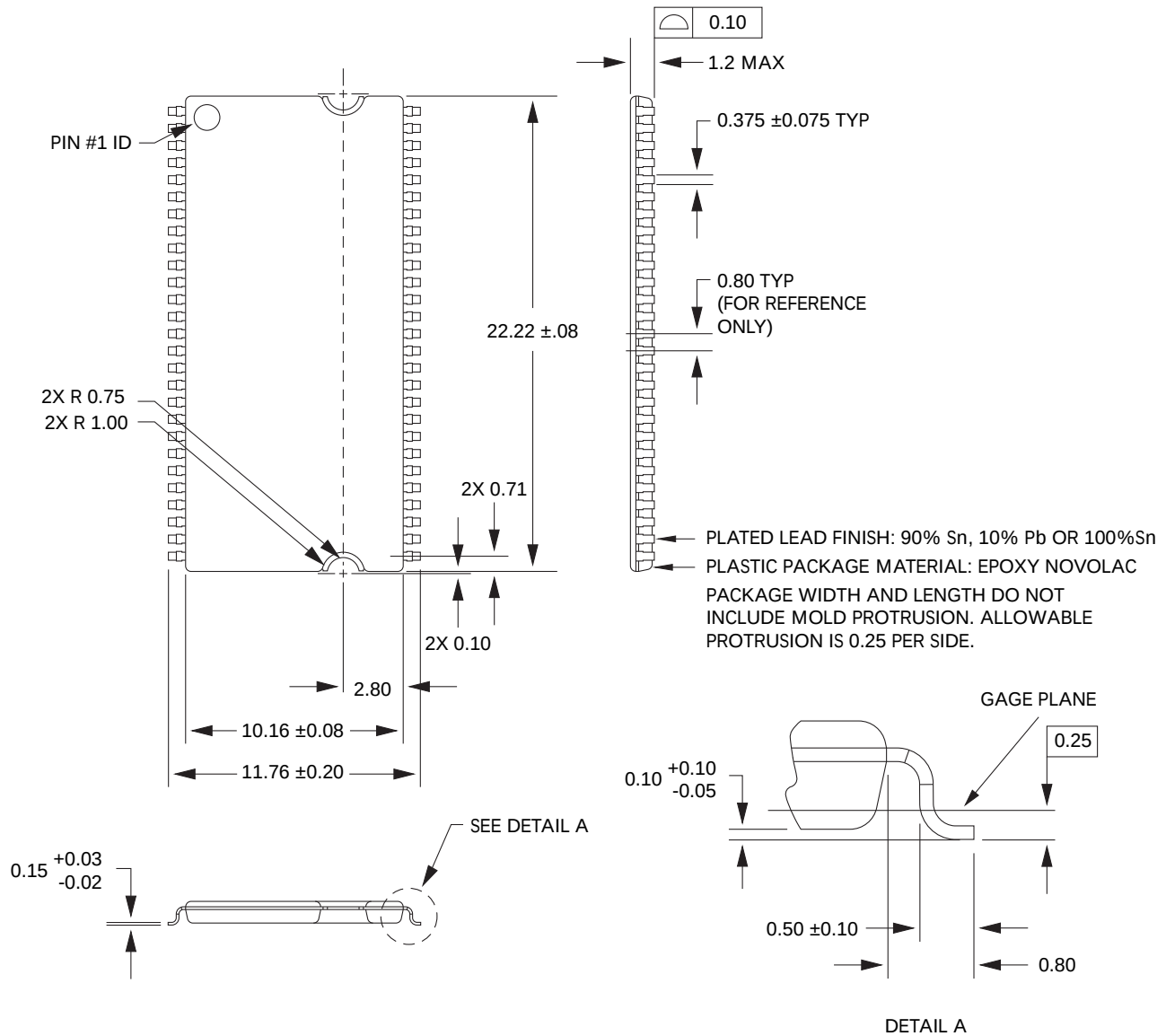
Figure 54: Write – DQM Operation

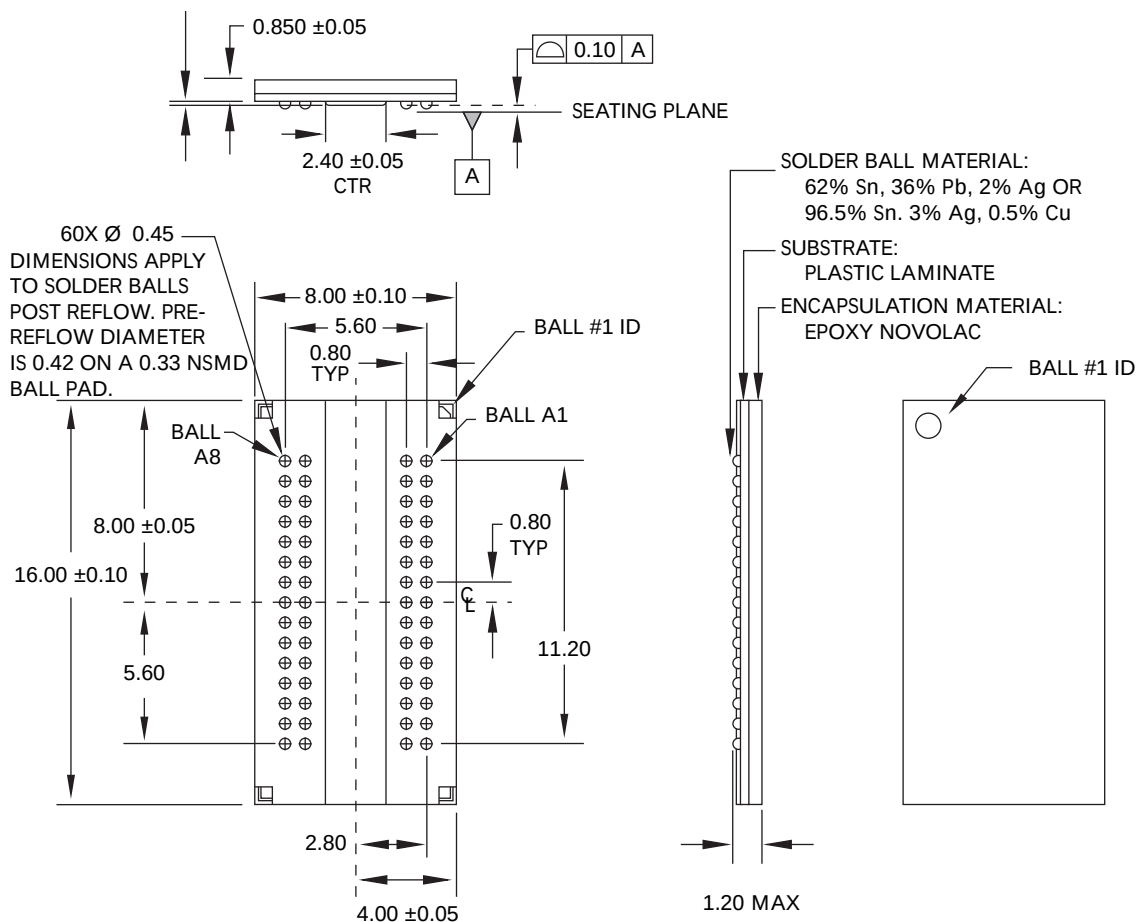

Figure 55: 54-Pin Plastic TSOP (400 mil)



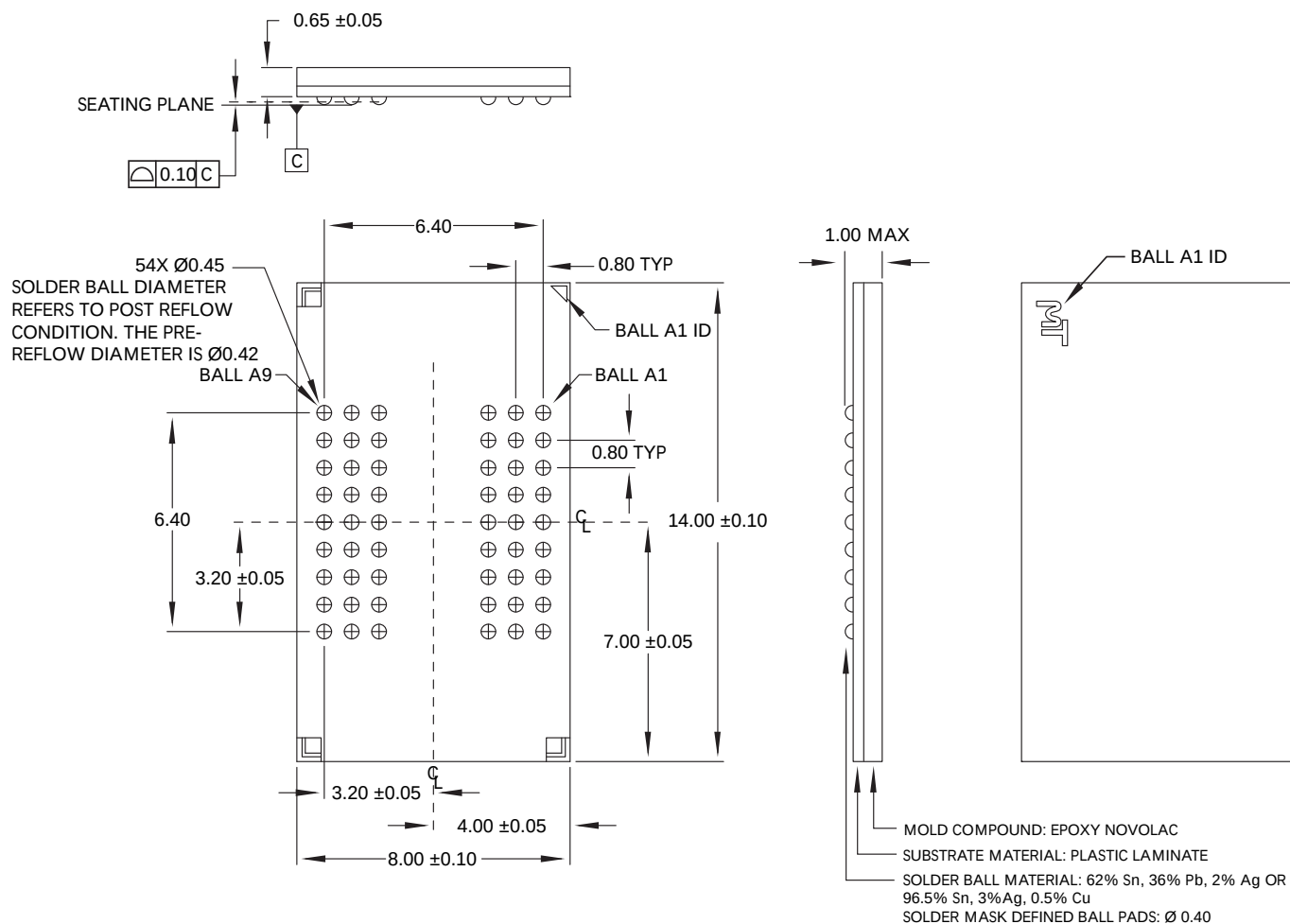
